
COUNCILLOR H. F. GROSVENOR denies the rumour current some time ago that he would move to Western Canada this spring. He finds this a good country and will stay here.





He could invariably tell in which direction the tree would fall.

He was fond of music, and learned to play a violin well. With his music he was able to make considerable money, as he gave dances and picnics, at which he was the only music-


