Coun. Shaw—The way I understood it is  
that the old collectors do not hold office after  
this council meets unless they are re-appointed.  
If a ratepayer finds that he has to pay  
at a certain time, and at an early date, we  
will be in a better position and he will likely  
pay. They have ample time now and it is  
better to pay one than two years taxes.

The secretary-treasurer explained how it  
was that he appears to have a large sum of  
money on hand when in reality he does not  
have very much real cash. There are witness  
fees and jury fees that have to be paid. On  
the suggestion of the auditor he pays these  
bills in cash, takes the receipts and when the  
particular business is concluded, he issues a  
check for the whole. Probably about \$700  
has now been taken out in jury fees. Recently  
there were two juries summoned, and one  
jury of seven men cost between \$120 and  
\$140. There have been large juries in the  
county court. Most of these juries have been  
paid some few have not been. So that he  
had receipts for between \$600 and \$700 paid  
out. He generally kept on hand about \$300  
to cash checks after banking hours and for  
the remainder of the \$1000 mentioned he has  
receipts. When the auditor reports that I  
have \$1000 I really have not that amount in  
cash but the receipts with the cash on hand  
would make the amount.

Moved by Coun. Williams, seconded by  
Coun. Phillips, that J. C. Hartley be re-  
elected secretary-treasurer for another year.  
Carried.

Moved by Coun. Carvell, seconded by  
Coun. Phillips, that D. McLeod Vince be re-  
elected auditor for ensuing year. Carried.

Coun. Balsam—Under the head of reports  
from standing committees, the finance com-  
mittee can only say that the auditor has made  
his report and we have nothing further to  
add to it at present.

Coun. Fewer—As chairman of the com-  
mittee we have nothing much to report in the  
building line. There were some little re-  
pairs needed on the flooring of the jail, which  
we have attended to, and outside of that we  
have been to but little expense since last  
meeting of council.

Secretary Treasurer Hartley—Returning  
to the subject of collectors, I have tried to  
get the collectors working so that they would  
have as small a list as possible. I have as-  
sisted the collectors in every way. They  
come to me about the middle of December  
asking for advice as to how they should pro-  
ceed in making collections. That is no time  
to come and I cannot advise them then. Let  
them come early in November. They must  
have 30 days in which to sell property and  
they cannot do much by getting advice in the  
middle of December. I think the parishes  
should give collectors a good percentage on  
the collections. When this is done the pa-  
rishes have a small defaulters' list. Richmond  
pays the lowest rate and you see the result.  
Pay the collectors well on the amount of col-  
lections and if they are good men they will  
do good work; if they are no good you had  
better get rid of them. You cannot get good  
work from a man who pays more for shoe  
leather than he is getting in commission.  
Brighton, Kent and Peel are now in good  
shape when they were the opposite before  
increasing the percentage to collectors. One  
man had about \$1300 to collect, and he had  
a delinquent list of \$900; that man was  
working on a low percentage.

Coun. Owens—Was there not a committee  
appointed to see about having the proceed-  
ings printed in outside papers? I have not  
heard any report from that committee.

**Fear the Vatican May Be Plundered.**

That the Vatican has long been an object  
of alarming attentions and interest to the an-  
archists is, says a writer in the N. Y. Tri-  
bune, well known to the Italian and foreign  
Governments. In fact, one of the reasons  
why so large a garrison of picked troops is  
always maintained in the Eternal City is to  
protect the Vatican from the pillage and de-  
struction to which it would be subjected if  
once a revolutionary mob led by anarchists  
got beyond control at Rome. Indeed, in re-  
cent years the Government, at the instance  
of the Papacy, has repaired and placed in or-  
der, ready for immediate use, the long brick-  
ed gallery or tunnel which connects the Vati-  
can with the old fortress of San Angelo,  
where so many Popes have been compelled in  
ancient times to seek refuge from the popu-  
lace, and to which the present pontiff and his  
court would withdraw in the event of any  
revolutionary invasion of the Vatican.

The latter is known to be crowded as no  
other palace in the world not merely with  
priceless masterpieces of art and archaeology,  
but also with an enormous amount of treas-  
ure in precious metals, gems, and bullion. It  
has sometimes been asserted that there is no  
building in the world, not even the Bank of  
England, which contains such a colossal  
amount of wealth within so small an area.  
Necessarily it constitutes a temptation not  
only to those anarchists who argue that funds  
alone are needed to put their nihilistic pro-  
jects into execution, but also those particu-  
larly dangerous and clever criminals who affect  
political ideals as a means to felony, and who  
find rich pickings in every revolutionary in-  
surrection. The greedy eyes, then, of all  
criminal and anarchist Europe and America  
are concentrated on the Vatican and the loot  
which it contains, and the destruction of St.  
Peter's would probably immediately precede  
or accompany the invasion of the home of  
the Papacy.


