Upper Woodstock, Jan. 8th, 1907.

Council met at 10 a. m., the following members being present:—

J. C. Hartley, the secretary-treasurer, called the meeting to order. He explained that the Warden, A. G. Bailey, was confined to the house by sickness and it would be necessary to elect a warden.

Coun. Williams, seconded by Coun. Keenan, nominated Coun. D. H. Lamont of Aberdeen as warden for the ensuing year.

Coun. Balsam said he had no objections to Coun. Lamont personally but he thought that Coun. Bailey was elected warden during the life of the council and, as he had not sent in his resignation, he (Balsam) thought that another warden could not be legally elected.

After a discussion on the subject in which it was pointed out that of late years all wardens have been elected annually, the matter dropped.

Voted that the nominations close. The secretary then declared Coun. Lamont warden for the current year.

Coun. Lamont then took the chair. He thanked the council for the honor conferred upon him and upon his parish. He appreciated the kindness of colleagues in electing him to such an honorable position which had been held in former years by some of the brainiest men in the county, all probably better fitted than he for the position. He hoped they would give him their hearty support and trusted their deliberation would be for the benefit of the county at large.

Warden Lamont read a letter from T. C. L. Ketchum, regretting his absence at the first session, and offering a tender to do the work of reporting the proceedings at the same rate as last year.

On motion of Coun. Fewer, seconded by Coun. Carvell, the tender was accepted.

Voted that John P. Maloney act as substitute for Mr. Ketchum in his absence.

Lt. Col. D. McLeod Vince submitted the Auditor's Report as follows:

To the Municipality of the County of Carleton.

Mr. Warden and Gentlemen,

The undersigned begs leave to report:—

1. That he has not been able to make a thorough audit of the accounts of the books and accounts of the Secretary treasurer, owing to the fact that nearly all the returns of the Collectors of Rates of the several parishes that have been filed, have been rendered since the beginning of 1907, and that one collector in Brighton, two collectors in Kent, one collector in Wicklow, and the Collector in Woodstock Parish have not at the time of closing this report made returns.

2. From the examination your Auditor has made, of the books, accounts and vouchers of the Secretary Treasurer, he believes the same to be correct.

the County for the past support of some former residents of the County confined in the Provincial Hospital which will materially reduce the credit balance of those Parishes.

8. The undersigned suggests that the Secretary-Treasurer be instructed to close his books and Accounts in each year, one week before the Annual Meeting of the Council; and that all Collectors be ordered to render their returns to the Secretary-treasurer on or before the 31st day of December in each year.

Auditor Vince showed in a brief speech that every parish in the county has improved financially during the past year. The parish of Wilmot has the smallest delinquent list in the county, the lists for the last three years having been entirely collected.

Coun. Owens—Wilmot has the best collectors in the county.

Mr. Vince—There is not the slightest doubt but that the Secretary's books are correct, but I cannot entirely check them off as I have not the necessary parish returns. It would be far better for both of us if the secretary closed his books one week before the meeting of Council, and authorize the collectors to make returns on or before Dec. 31st. I cannot do justice to myself and make out a satisfactory report without the returns from parish officers. The total bank balance is now \$2090.31, and there is \$1000 in the hands of the secretary. Actually we have a surplus of about \$3000. I would not, however, advise reducing the assessment, for in February we will have the county school draft to meet. I have tried to render as full an account as possible, but it is only fair to the secretary and myself that the returns should be in early.

Moved by Coun. Williams, seconded by Coun. Melville, that the report of the auditor be received, accepted, and the suggestions carried out.

Coun. Flemming—I am not in favor of the motion if the collectors are bound to pass over their books on December 31st. If that is so there will be a larger deficit in some parishes than at present. It will be much better if the collectors have full time, even if the report of auditor is held over until June session. We should not compel collectors to hand over their books on December 31st.

Auditor—All I wish is the returns. The collectors of course can hold their books.

Coun. Carvell—If we pass the motion we are forcing the collectors which is a right move, and they can get after the ratepayers.

Coun. Flemming—I am only seeking information. What I object to, is asking the collectors to hand over their books to the J. P.'s.

Coun. Williams—Suppose we appoint new officers today, can the old collectors continue the work?

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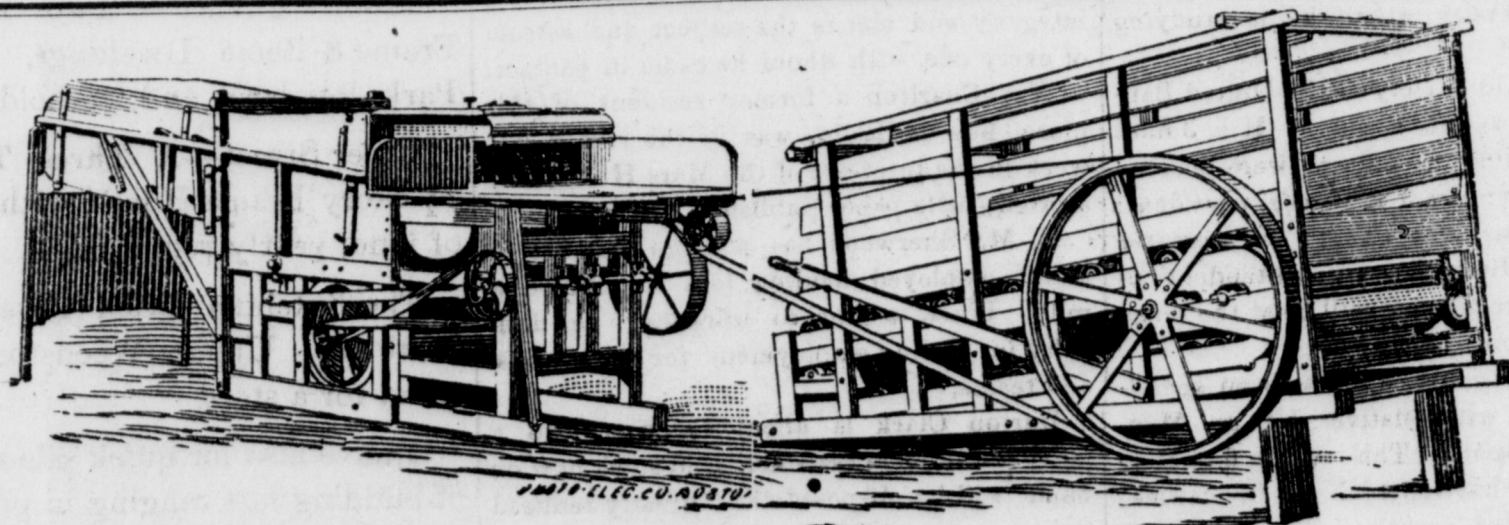
