Mr. Costigan was for years a member of the conservative government, and on the defeat of his party he at once accepted a position in Mr. Laurier's cabinet. Mr. Gilmor was a candidate for parliament in the last general election and was defeated. He is a son of the late Arthur Hill Gilmor who for five terms, from 1874, represented Charlotte in the House of Commons and was afterwards appointed to the senate. The Hon. George W.
