Diaz and the Brigands.

When Porfirio Diaz became President in
1884 Mexico was full of brigands and cut-
throats. The mountain swarmed with bands
of outlaws in league with confederates in the
cities who kept them posted to the move-
ment of travelers. Diaz knew that the re-
sources of Mexico could not be developed
until brigandage was stamped out, so the
orders were to execute all brigands. He
overawed to a great extent the lawless popu-
lation, but the mountains were still fastnesses
for thieving bands. Then a bright idea came
to him, says the Arena. Many, perhaps
most, of these men had lost all they possessed
during the fierce wars. They had become
outlaws largely through the force of untoward
circumstances. Might it not be a wise thing
to offer these Ishmaels of civilization the op-
portunity to regain their foothold among law-
abiding citizens? Accordingly, when the
brigands were caught they were questioned.
"How much money do you obtain a week on
the average in your lawless and criminal life?"
The prisoners answered. Diaz pondered. At
last he announced that he would pay the
bandits double the amount which they claimed
as the average they obtained by thieving.
He would enroll them as members of the
Mexican Constabulary or Rurales, and they
were to extend this offer to all the members
of the bands they knew; but each man must
swear to serve the State with fidelity, and if
any bandits refused to accept this offer they
were to be hunted down and killed wherever
found. The idea worked admirably. Soon
Mexico was like another land, and the
Rurales became the strongest military and
police arm of the Republic.

Sleeping Outdoors.

Many persons, with the best will in the
world to live in obedience to the laws of
health, make a failure of the open-air night,
of which one now hears so much, and which
is, in fact, the chief dependence in the treat-
ment of tuberculosis.

There are several reasons why the attempt
to sleep outdoors, whether literally or in a
wide-open room, results in failure. It is such
a radical departure with so many persons that
they do not have the first idea how to start it.
A great many of them have at the back of
their minds a sort of lingering impression
that discomfort is a part of the treatment;
that to become hardened one must be
wretched, and that misery and virtue are
boon companions. As comfort is not expect-
ed, there are no plans made to capture it.
The would-be disciple of health simply
throws up all the windows, gets into bed
with the usual coverings, perhaps lies all
night with the uncovered head in a direct
draft of air, shivers in semiwakefulness for
hours, and then, on rising in the morning
chilled and devalitized, perhaps coughing and
sneezing, condemns the whole scheme as a
snare, returns the next night to the closed-
window plan, and launches himself upon
society as the prophet of stuffiness.

This is all wrong, and a little thought will
show why. If the night air is to be breathed
as it comes straight from outside, as it should
be, preparations must be made to welcome it
and a room in which the temperature is twenty
degrees or thirty degrees Fahrenheit cannot
be occupied in the same clothing as one
kept at sixty degrees.

Down coverlets are invaluable for these
cold, fresh-air nights, for they are as light as
they are warm. Many persons are averse to
heavy bed-clothing, and they are right.
Weight does not necessarily imply warmth,
and it is foolish to use up vital force in hold-
ing up heavy weights during the hours con-
secrated to rest.

The sleeping garment itself should be of
some light and warm material, preferably
woolen. Special thought should be given to
the protection of the head. People, at any
rate in this part of the world, are not accus-
tomed to going bareheaded in the open air,
so there is really no reason why they should
expect to do so with impunity for seven or
eight hours in cold weather at night. A soft
cap cut to cover the ears and to hang down
the back of the neck should always be worn.
This shape closes the little space between the
cap and the bedclothes, and incidentally pre-
vents many a stiff neck.

A hot-water bottle is a good friend on a
bitter night, and is worth more than many
top spreads, for the bottle generates heat
while the spread only retains it.

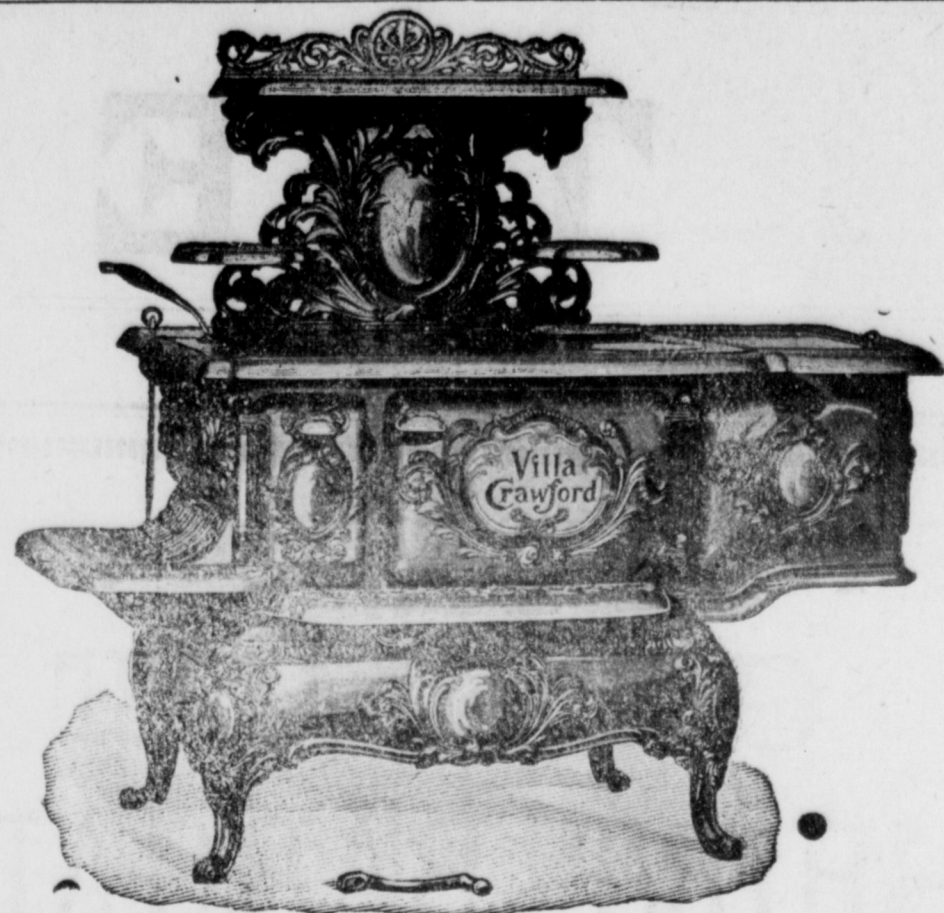

Noise and the Nerves.

(London Truth.)

It was Schopenhauer who said that in-
sensitivity to noise was the surest indica-
tion of a low and undeveloped nervous organiza-
tion, on which assumption it is certain that
we as a nation can hardly be reckoned very
far advanced. Certain it is that we are more
tolerant under this head than any other
nation professing to call itself civilized,
though I fancy the Americans run us pretty
close in this respect. Sir Arthur Sullivan
was wont to compose in the middle of the
night because he could never obtain quiet at
any other time, and without expecting the
impossible or looking for legislation on a
subject which is merely of concern to the
community at large, irrespective of party
issue, surely it is not too much to ask that
the local authorities shall put their heads to-
gether on this matter and exercise the
powers which they possess. Bernard Shaw
once expressed the opinion that it was the
"state-aided noises," as he called them,
which were the worst offenders—as for
example, the church bells and the military
bands.

The "rescue chamber" is a safety provision
of some of the ltrife Austrian mines. It is a
strongly timbered retreat, and its single
entrance has a door that can be made tight
against air and water by means of rubber
fitings. It has three cylinders of oxygen,
sufficient to enable thirty men to breathe
three days. Inhalation gear is at hand for
parties leaving the chamber for recon-
naissance or signalling, canned food, medi-
cines and first-aid appliances are also kept in
the place. The standard room will accom-
modate twenty-four men for a reasonable
time for rescue.

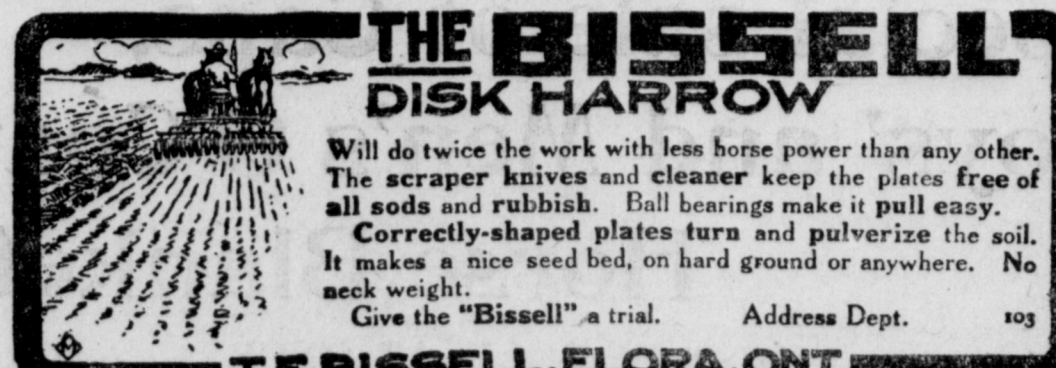
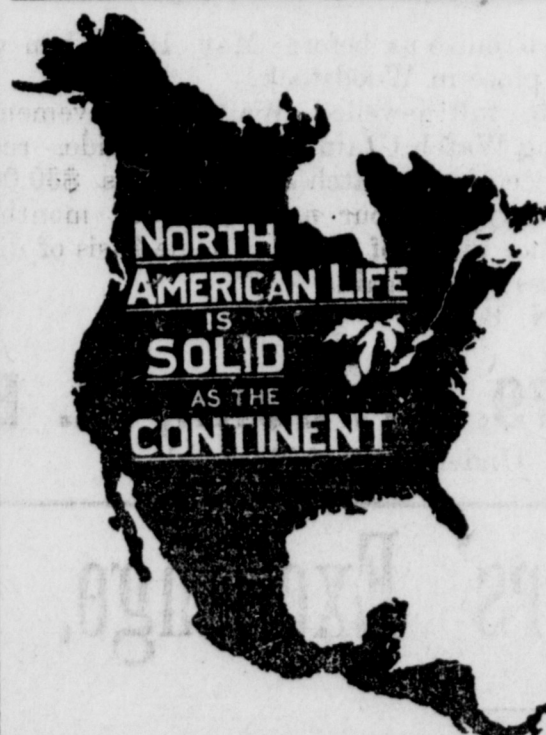
