Playing cards for money has become a very common occurrence with women of fashion. Whatever the sum hazarded the principle remains the same. Gambling has crept in by imperceptible degrees, and has familiarized itself as a society pastime.

A generation ago it would have been regarded as shocking and disreputable in the extreme for decent and virtuous women, mothers and wives and sisters, to play at games of chance here in America.

Since bridge whist became popular it has monopolized the attention and time and formed the chief diversion of elegant women in homes where luxuries abound and a golden stream flows in full tide from the pockets of men whose names are potential in Wall Street and in the finances of the world. The money kings make possible the costly amusements of the money queens and the money princesses.

A few months ago a girl visitor at a country home found herself singled out for observation and treated with patronizing insolence and ridicule by fellow guests because she had the courage of her convictions, and her training, and absolutely refused to be a partner in any game that was played for money. If only young girls and older women in society would accept the position taken by this conscientious and fearless young woman an enormous amount of misery and suffering would be prevented and the tide of reckless passion in society gambling would be stemmed.

At the root of gambling lies the falsity of trying to get something for nothing. So long as we pay our money for value received we are in the right. The gambler is little better than the thief, and has in rectitude no advantage over the latter, except in so far as his operations are conducted in the open. To cheat at cards is regarded as the lowest depth into which a civilized human being can sink. This degradation does not often befall the fair gamblers of society. They do not condescend to cheat their opponents. This is the one bit of honor they can claim. They are spendthrifts of money, of time, of temper and of brains. Little by little they grow sordid and cruel and cease to care for the ideas that shine before womanhood and make it radiant in purity and exalted in tone.

Possibly there are those who do not think it necessary to sound a warning note against the evils of gambling as engaged in by our women of wealth. They say, with some show of truth, that the smart set has its narrow limitations and that its manners and customs do not particularly affect or impress the rank and file of the nation. In a measure this may be taken for granted. Only in a measure. Gradually, but certainly, there has happened to us in this country a deterioration in our standard. Most of us condone many things on which our mothers and grandmothers sternly frowned. The newspapers chronicle the doings of society and women of small incomes as well as working women who earn their bread by long hours of toil, eagerly read about the woman who live in splendor, and like the lilies of the field, take no anxious thought for their treatment. Why should they? Their only difficulty is to secure brilliant costumes for brilliant occasions from the dressmakers whose styles are paid for at prices per gown that would keep a poor man's family the larger part of a year.

Everyone is reaching up to climb the ladder. To do as those do who are better off than we, to have things as they have them, are the aims and ambitions of far too many of us. So it comes to pass that in little villages, in small towns and select circles that have not the faintest expectation of ever seeing anything beyond the glittering outside of that society which is spelled with a capital S., there is an evident strain to do as people do there.

The sober common sense of American women may be trusted not to go too far in this alien and lamentable line. Still it is worth while to safeguard our daughters and our sons against a manifest peril.

The social fabric cannot be moth eaten by indolence and dishonesty anywhere without injury that extends throughout its entire length and breath.

It rests with women of culture and education, with women of leisure and gentle breeding, to set the right pace for their sisters throughout the entire country. Women cannot be too austere in virtue, nor too exacting in morality. With them must remain the responsibility for keeping pure and noble the atmosphere and the life of the home. It is, therefore, a tremendous misfortune that women who preside over our most beautiful homes should suffer them to be invaded by gambling.—Condensed from an article by Margaret E. 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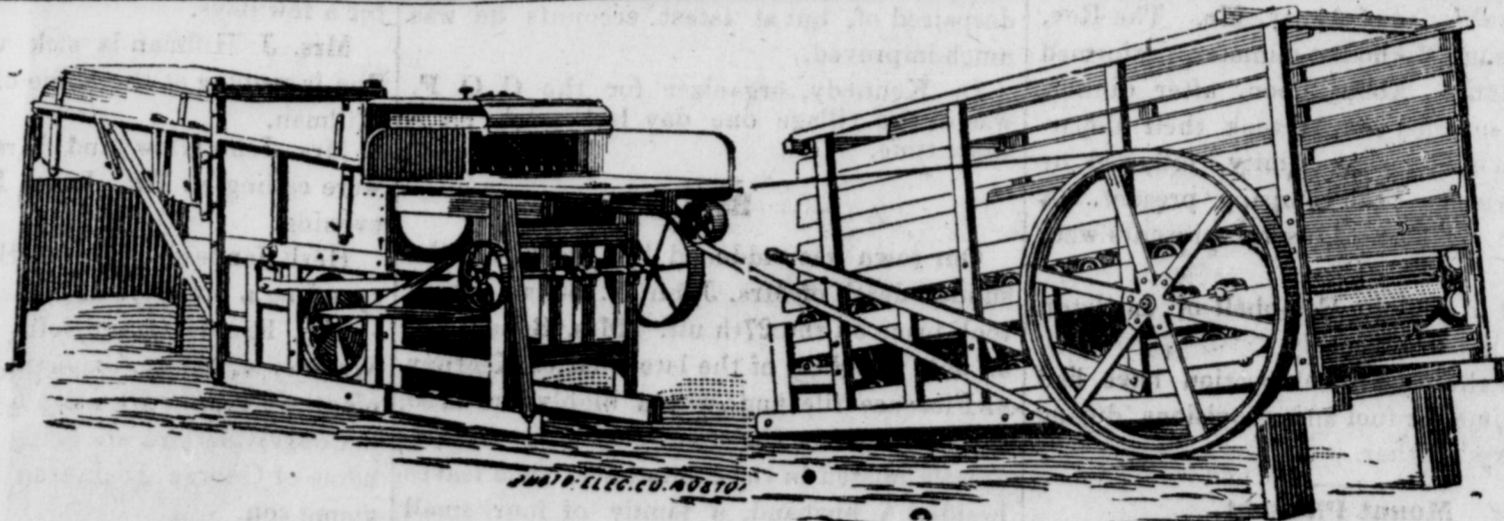
