Let us suppose that the newspaper could be censored, so as to exclude from publication all mention of crimes, outrages, catastrophes and shocking events of all sorts. and the columns of the press were filled with accounts of charitable and religious occurrences and everything that can be considered decent and entirely respectable. What a paradise it would make for criminals, villains and rascals of every sort. The most of them would never be brought to trial but for the publicity given by the press, and if the same sort of suppression of the truth were extended to the courts, few would ever be convicted, since the pressure of public opinion in important cases goes a long way with the average jury Fortunately, secret trials of criminals are barred by the national constitution, if that counts for anything.

The same considerations of justice which demand a public trial demand likewise the printing of the testimony. There is no argument in favor of suppressing or garbling the evidence which does not apply as well to the exclusion of the public from the court room. The right "to a speedy and public trial" is fundamental.

The Origin of "Plug" Tobacco.

Ball after ball would be rammed in and pounded until the whole became a selid plug. When the hole was nearly full we would pound in a plug, and then the log would be put away to season. As the wood dried the moisture would be drawn from the bebacco. And when it was taken from it we galled it "plug" tobacco, and that's where the name originated."


The Clambler's . Hands.
