Stetson, Cutler & Co. Buy Land on Tobique.

The most notable occurrence in connection with the crown land sale last week at the Crown land department Fredericton was the disposition displayed by the Stetson, Cutler Company, of St. John and Boston, to enlarge on their holdings on the Tobique, which is taken by other lumbermen to mean they intend extending the property which they purchased from the N. H. Murchie Company some time ago, so as to make it one of the largest lumber properties in the province. Two lots in Victoria county provided bidding. The first was a 98-acre lot on the south side of Tobique River below Oxbow, application for which was made by Douglas Jenkins. It was finally bid in for the Stetson, Cutler Company at \$1.25 per acre. The second was a hundred-acre lot on the south side of the Tobique River opposite Sisson Brook, application for which had been made by Turney W. Johnston. It was bid in by the Stetson, Cutler Company at \$1.05 per acre.

It is certainly a trifle startling to read that France has tendered her good offices in helping the United States and Japan to compose their differences. In our good-natured American way, we had forgotten that there were differences to compose. True, there had been an anti-Japanese flurry on the Pacific coast, which the President had first withstood and then surrendered to; and we were cheerfully proposing to exclude all Japanese laborers, but who could have imagined that Japan would be hurt by a little thing like that? If she gave us everything that we asked, and allowed us to treat her subjects as we pleased, we were prepared to be really effusive in verbal friendship for her. But if, after all, the Japanese are going to act as if they were a high-spirited people with rights which they intend to insist upon, why, it will only confirm every American country newspaper and grocery-store conference in the opinion, which they share with Dr. Johnson, that foreigners are, as far as can be made out, mostly fools.

An Era of Dear Money.

According to ex-Congressman, C. A. Pugsley, a member of the Executive Council of the American Bankers' Association, the world has entered on a long period of dearer money. "The time for low interest even on high class investments, is past," said Mr. Pugsley. "Those who have money to invest at present are fortunate, for they have the right to expect 4 1/2 and even 5 per cent. on gilt-edged securities of all kinds.

"A few years ago 3 per cent. was considered enough for the investor. Then the price rose to 4; now this is found not enough, and it will be many years before the rate is reduced to its former level. The best of it is that earnings of commercial enterprises are so great in America that they can afford to pay the higher interest."

"Salary" and "Wages."

In deciding that the Winter German opera singers received "salary or wages," Mr. Justice Warrington observed that he preferred the old English word "wages" and pointed out that a Judge's pay was so called. The distinction between "salary" and "wages" is a very nice point. Etymologically, their origins are very diverse. "Wages" are really rewards of labor stipulated to be paid, the idea being that the sum is pledged or "engaged," put under pledge—the same "gage" appearing also in "mortgage" and "wages." "Salary" is simply "salarium," salt money, the allowance for salt given to Roman soldiers, which afterward came to mean a pension, stipend or "salary" in the modern sense.

Non-Flaking Whitewash.

To prepare whitewash for fences, buildings, shop interiors, etc., that will not flake and fall off, mix one quart fine Portland cement with about eight gallons whitewash. The cement binds the whitewash to the wood and makes a permanent covering which is unaffected by weather conditions. The small quantity of cement used and the constant stirring necessary to keep the whitewash in good condition for applying, prevents the cement hardening in lumps at the bottom of the pail as might be expected.

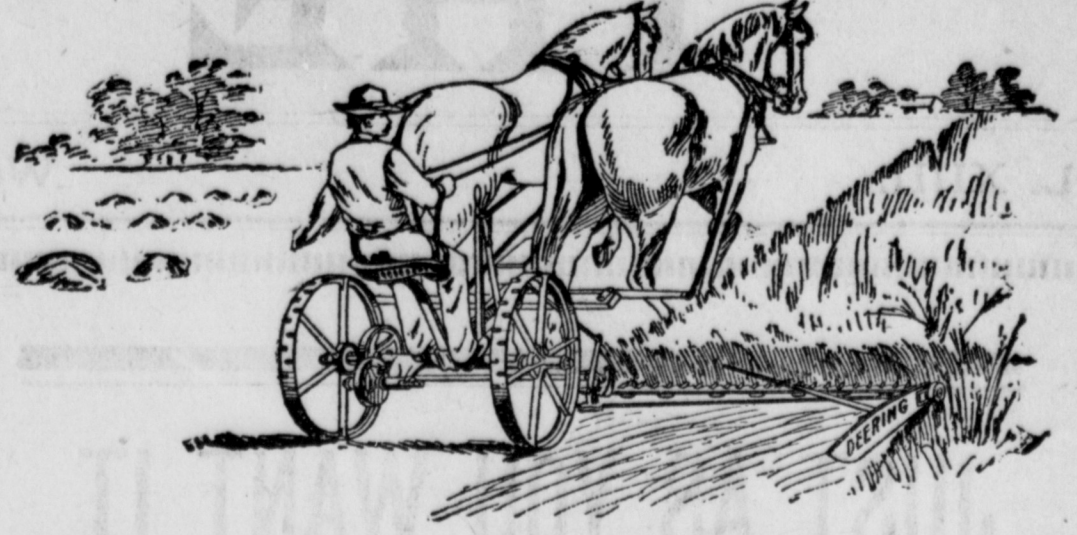
Volunteer Discipline.
