MRS ROY SHAW, of Montreal, second daughter of Senator Thompson, Fredericton, died suddenly on Sunday night. She was taken to the hospital with typhoid fever last week and subsequently developed pneumonia of which she died. Mrs. Shaw leaves a little girl about seven months old. Her husband himself is critically ill with pneumonia. Mr. Shaw was at one time in the Bank of Nova Scotia in Woodstock under George Sander-son's management.

THE SUPREME COURT of Fredericton, delivered judgment in the case of the Town of Woodstock vs. Smith. This was an application for rule nisi to quash a conviction made by the police magistrate of Woodstock for violating a town bye-law regulation, by the sale of non-intoxicating beer. Smith sold beer without a license, and it was held by his counsel that the law was ultra vires. In delivering judgment, Judge McLeod said that possibly the bye-law may have gone beyond what the provisions of the act warranted, but he held that it was good, in so far as the council had power to act. That question scarcely arose in the case, however. The defendant had no license and simply sold in violation of the law. The conviction was good, and therefore the rule must be discharged.

A LARGE and interested audience attended the concert in the opera house on Thursday evening last given by the Schubert Concert Company, under the auspices of the High School Club. The ladies quartette is one of the best that has sung in Woodstock for a long time. They rendered several difficult classical selections in a finished manner and had to respond to each number. Miss Edith Young, the first soprano and Miss Lovie Zandt Purcell, the second alto, each sang a solo which brought forth much applause. Thomas Purcell, the violinist, rendered several selections which were much appreciated, especially his last number. The last number on the programme by the full company, and one of the prettiest selections of the evening, was spoiled by a number of the audience leaving the hall. Altogether the concert was a most enjoyable one.
