Boxes will be issued on payment of one dollar, which amount will be refunded if the box is returned to the bank in good condition.

The Bank officials will retain keys of the boxes, which can only be operated in the bank.

If it is desired to open a box in order to deposit the contents in the Savings Department, the holder must bring the box to the bank and present it to the Teller, who holds the key. All amounts deposited will be entered in a regular Savings Bank book and interest at current rates will be added four times a year.

Miramichi Lumber Cut.

Mr. M. Welch, the well known lumberman of Bristol, who was in the city today estimates that the lumber cut on the Miramichi the coming season will exceed that of last season by about ten million feet. The total cut last year was one hundred and ten million feet, eighty million being taken on the Southwest Miramichi and tributaries and thirty million on the Northwest. This season Mr. Welch thinks the Northwest cut will total 40 millions while the cut on the Southwest and tributaries will be about the same as last year.
