Following is the platform of the Conservative party as laid down by Mr. Borden.

Honest appropriation and expenditure of public moneys.

Provisions to punish bribery and fraud at elections.

Publicity as to expenditure by political organizations.

Reformation of the laws relating to the civil service.

A reform in the mode of selecting Senators, so as to make the Senate more useful.

More careful selection of sources from which immigration shall be sought.

Operation of Government railways by an independent commission.

Management of public domain so that increment arising therefrom shall inure to the people.

Development and improvement of national waterways.

Reorganization of the present Railway Commission as a Public Utilities Commission with wider powers.

Establishment of a system of national telegraphs and telephones.

Improvement of existing postal facilities.

Promotion of a mutual trade preference within the empire.

A fiscal policy to produce in Canada all articles that can be produced and manufactured, having due regard to the interests of the consumer and wage-earning population.

Thanksgiving Day.

The Canadian Manufacturers' Association has forwarded to the Government, through Secretary Murray, a resolution endorsing the request of the Commercial Travellers' Associations, that Thanksgiving Day this year be held on a Monday instead of Thursday. It is pointed out that Monday is a more convenient day for those who wish to travel home for the day, and that an interruption of business in the middle of this week is undesirable. Hon. Mr. Scott, Secretary of State, in replying to the request, noted that it is the custom, both in Great Britain and the United States, and has herefore been the custom in Canada, to have Thanksgiving Day on a Thursday. However, he promised that the Government would carefully consider the matter at an early date.

There is a wide-spread fallacy that no act of a minor is binding in law. Those who entertain that opinion may be interested in a decision handed down by the Appellate Division of the New York Supreme Court. The decision had to do with a suit for damages brought against a railway company by a mother who had entrusted the checking of a trunk to her fifteen-year-old son. The lock on the trunk being defective, the company, when it checked the trunk, secured from the boy a signed release from responsibility. In handing down its decision, which was favorable to the railway company, the court said, "The fact that the son was a minor did not incapacitate him from acting as an agent, the well-know rule being that contracts made by an infant as an agent are binding upon the principal."

New England, it appears, is not the region where abandoned farms are most numerous. The Department of Agriculture finds that New York State offers the most remarkable example of the decline of farming. In twenty-five years the farm lands of New York have declined in value to the extent of a hundred and seventy million dollars, and more than twelve thousand farms have been abandoned. Increased population and the improvement of farming methods will some day force a renewal occupation of these Eastern farm lands, whose owners have been lured away by commercial opportunity and the broader field of the West.
