### Books in the Home.

Children should early be taught the proper way to open and hold a book. All heavy books require especial care. When too heavy for the hand, they should rest on a table or a stand.

Any standard book of prose and poetical quotations comes next in importance in the family library. A book of English synonyms follows in order of desirability.

Popular nature books are delightful, particularly where there are children to enjoy the information about stars and plants and animals.

The children should be taught how to use reference books, to look up meanings, spellings, places, and so on. The habit of looking up whatever needs greater elucidation augurs well for good culture and education. The child that has acquired it requires but little going to school in order to surpass those who have expensive schooling, but no training in the use of reference books.

### Paying For Old Wars.

The fact, pointed out in this column last week, that the United States, on July 1, will make its last payment for the expenses of specie resumption in 1879, has attracted interest to the question, how other nations stands in that regard. The case of England is strikingly interesting. Until the Goschen Act of 1888 fixed 1923 for the maturity of the British Government's debt, no fixed term was ever set. Like the French 3 per cent. rentes, consols were perpetual. Nevertheless, they were annually redeemed in large amounts for the sinking fund. Between the Peace of Paris, which ended the Napoleonic Wars in 1815, and the outbreak of the Crimean War in 1854, the debt was reduced £56,812,000, or an average of £1,420,000 per annum; between the Crimean War and 1900, it was reduced £4,800,000 per annum. That was too slow a pace, however, to extinguish, even in a century, a debt which footed up \$861,039,000 when Napoleon went to St. Helena. The Crimean War of 1854 added £32,918,000 to the debt; the total debt at the outbreak of the Boer War in 1899 was £629,978,000, and it has increased largely since 1899. That is to say, the British Government is still paying interest on £500,000,000 to £600,000,000 debt contracted before 1815, and the British people are still footing the bills of Trafalgar, the German struggles, the Peninsular campaign, and Waterloo.

The contrast between this experience and our own is the more striking, in that our own public debt August, 1865, was \$2,381,530,000, or more than one-half of the public debt of \$4,305,000,000, reported by England fifty years before.—New York Post.

SEALED TENDERS (in duplicate) for the supply of Coal and Fuel Wood required to heat the Military Buildings at St. John, Fredericton, Woodstock and Sussex, N. B., for the twelve months beginning 1st July, 1907, will be received up to Saturday, July 13th next. Each tender is to be marked "Tender for Fuel," and addressed to the Secretary of the Militia Council, Ottawa. Printed forms of tender containing full particulars may be obtained from the Secretary of the Militia Council, Ottawa, or at the Office of the District Officer Commanding St. John, who will furnish all information required.

Each tender must be accompanied by an accepted cheque, payable to the order by the Honourable the Minister of Militia and Defence, for five per cent of the amount of the tender, which will be forfeited if the party making the tender declines to sign a contract when called upon to do so. If the tender be not accepted the cheque will be returned.
