FORT FAIRFIELD Review: At least seven starch-factories in Aroostook county are now grinding potatoes for starch-two owned by John Watson of Houlton; one at Bridge-water; G. M. Colbath's, Spragues Mill; the Goodwin Starch Company's, and Klippel & Richards', Fort Fairfield; and Ward & Simonson's, Limestone. Only one, the Goodwin Starch Company's has been going any length of time. The price paid now is usually 20 cents a barrel, but varies from 5 cents to 25. The Goodwin Starch Company bought several car loads the other day, all loaded for 5 cents per barrel, but had to pay the freight on them from Caribou. There proved to be rather more potatoes in the country than most people had any idea of. It is predicted that the factories will run till August.
