The New Methodist Church.

The building committee of the Methodist church have practically decided to build their new church of pressed brick instead of the Tobique red limestone, on account of the difficulty of getting the Tobique stone and the uncertainty of their being able to get a sufficient quantity.

The contract for the granite for the base has been given to Powers & Brewer.

The work of tearing down the old church has now been going on two weeks and a half and it is thought the ground will be clear by Saturday night. There will be very little excavating to do for the new basement.

The old church had a seating capacity, including the gallery, of 625. The auditorium of the new building will seat 420 and the Sunday school room which can be added to it 225, a total of 645. But as the gallery in the old church was not used it will be seen that the auditorium of the new church will be large enough for almost all purposes.

Accidental Death.

Warren Law a brakeman on the Bangor & Aroostook railway was killed at Bangor on Tuesday of last week, June 11th. He was a son Mr. Jarvis S.
