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

A Dangerous Insect Enemy.

The brown tail moth, the appearance of which in Nova Scotia has caused much alarm among fruit growers in the maritime provinces, is one of the most destructive of insect enemies. The Year Book of the United States Department of Agriculture for 1905 tells us that it attacks not only fruit trees but ornamental shrubs and even forest trees, a particular fondness baving been developed by it for the foliage of the young oak.

The insect made its first appearance on this continent at Somerville, Mass., having been introduced, it is believed, in rose bushes imported from Holland. Since then it has spread over a large part of the state and has caused enormous damage. As the female flies and lays 300 eggs in a season, the rapidity with which infestation occurs will be readily understood, while the work of fighting the pest is rendered difficult by the fact they live, and as the males have wings, the that the ordinary strength of Paris green in the Bordeaux mixture is ineffective as against it. In Massachusetts it was found necessary to put in so much of Paris green that the foliage of the trees were burned, and it was on this account that arsenate of lead came into general use there.

The eggs of the insect are hatched in August, the caterpillars feed on leaves in the autumn and then spin a web in which they hibernate during winter. As soon as spring comes their work of destruction is resumed. It is while the trees are bare of foliage that the insect can most easily be destroyed by burning the winter nests.

slightest movement is made, and is absent or at least bearable when the patient lies perfectly quiet in bed, and also that the muscles are tender when gently squeezed. Lumbago occurs more frequently in gouty persons, although that is no explanation, since we do not know why the loins should suffer in gouty individuals more than the muscles of the neck.

In mild cases the drinking of an abundance of water, to which some baking-soda is added, may give a measure of relief. Gentle rubbing of the parts with a cloth dipped in ammonia and hot water will often mitigate the sufferand after the rubbing a cloth wet with this solution may be laid on the parts and covered with a hot-water bottle.

The diet should be light, without meat or highly seasoned food, and especially without beef tea or meat broths of any kind. The bowels should be kept open.

One who is subject to lumbago should be careful to avoid a chill, and should live frugally, avoiding the use of much meat or highly seasoned food in his diet, and drinking only plain water or milk.

Sometimes the attacks are prevented or May 22, 1907. made less frequent by the wearing of a broad flannel belt over the underclothing.

Cochfizeal.

Cochineal, so much used for coloring table jellies and also given to infants as a domestic remedy for whooping cough, is the whole insect of a class called coccus, but only the females are used. 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


