**Concerning the Hartland Fire.**  
On Saturday there was a session of the court of enquiry into the origin of the fire of July 15th. Justice Barnett presided and Marvin L. Hayward appeared as attorney for the commissioners. After hearing the evidence of several witnesses a further adjournment was made.

The result of the enquiry, begun two weeks ago, is so far satisfactory, except that the main point has not yet been reached. The identity of the man who touched the match is still unrevealed.

However the evidence so far given before the court shows beyond any possibility of doubt that the fire was of incendiary origin, that it started in the basement beneath W. F. Thornton's drug store, and that preparations for hastening the progress of the flames had been made by saturating the premises with oil and by the use of other inflammable material. All this was evident at the time of the fire, and the sworn testimony of a multitude of witnesses proves it true.

It is the determination of the fire commissioners and others to see the bottom of this affair, and in the interest of justice it is hoped they will succeed.

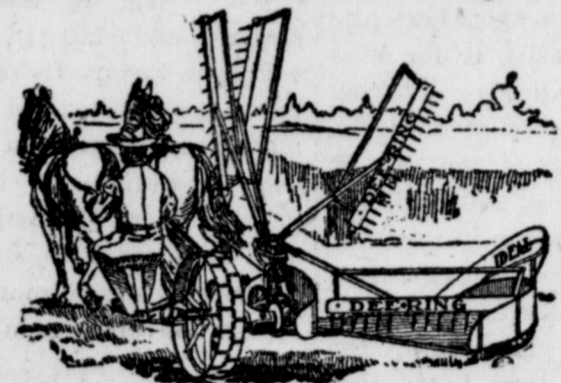
