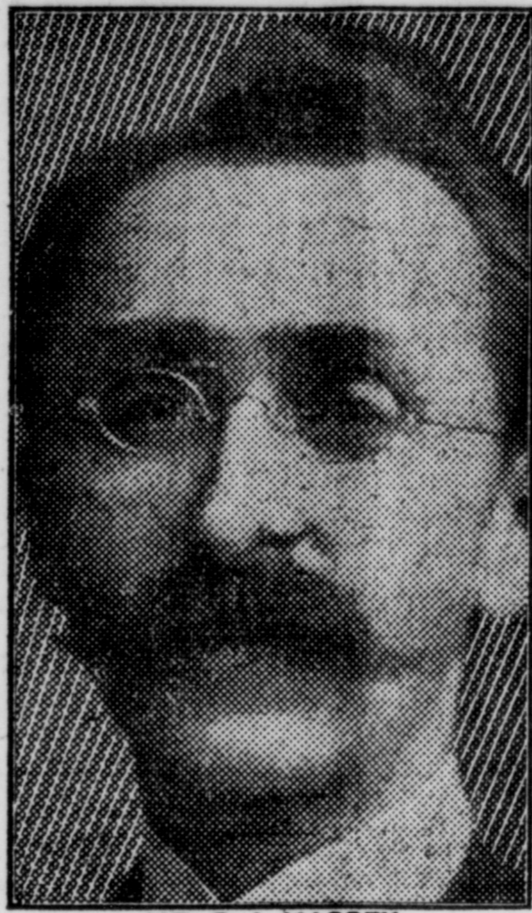
John Slater and Mr. and Mrs. Daniel McIntosh were out from Woodstock to attend the funeral of Mrs. Simpson.
