American Ostrich Farms.

The recent establishment of the Los Angeles Ostrich Farm within the city limits of Los Angeles gives California four ostrich enterprises-the others being at San Diego, South Pasadena, and San Jose. The initiative in the ostrich industry was taken about thirty years ago by Dr. Sketchley, who established a farm at Anaheim. Later on other men imported birds, and assisted in establishing the business. The greatest develop. ment of the business has been in Arizona, where there are at present over 2,000 birds. Their product of feathers has been sold principally to New York manufacturers. There is a tendency on the part of the ostrich feather growers to combine their efforts in building up the industry, and in this way give to the South-West a distinct industry characteristic of its climate and sunshine. At the present time fully \$12,000,000 worth of ostrich feather goods are sold annually in the United States, and of this amount California has sold approximately \$200,000, which proves that there is ample field for the California producers to enlarge their business.

Adam J. Beveridge.

The death of Adam J. Beveridge took place on Sunday, Sept. 29, at 6 p.m., at his home in Andover. The deceased had been in failing health for the past year, and had practically retired from business. He spent last winter with friends in the west and was able to be around during the summer. He attended service at the Presbyterian church the Sunday previous to his death, and was taken suddenly ill on the Monday following. He passed peacefully away in the 82nd year of his age.

Mr. Beveridge has been a familiar figure in this section of the province, where he has spent the greater part of his life. He was one of the pioneers of Victoria county. He had been all his life actively identified with the the lumbering and agricultural interests of the county. In his business relations with the first settlers of the county he acquired a fair knowledge of the French and Indian languages, and was popular with all classes of the community. He was honorable in his dealings, obliging in his disposition, a good

He was born on Dec. 28th, 1826, in Fossaway, Scotland, a son of William and Amelia Beveridge. He came out to this country in 1841 on a vessel called the John Carr which,. after a passage of tarty-seven days, discharged her passengers in St. John on May 17. Mr. Beveridge stayed in St. John for a few days with Robert Keltie who at that time carried on a brewing business where Messrs. Jones are now. Later he joined his half brother, Benjamin Beveridge, at what is now known as Perth.

He was twice married. His first wife was Amanda M. Murphy whom he married in 1848. They continued to live at Tobique or Anderson till 1851, when they moved to St. Francis. In 1864 they moved to Arthurette where Mrs. Beveridge died in 1873. In 1876 he married Mrs. Aaron Murphy. There are five children living, all by the first wife-Robert K., of Victoria county; Benjamin, Mrs. John Garnahan, of Vancouver; Mrs. George W. Kinney, of Fort Fairfield (Me.), and H. W. Beveridge. He served for years as a leading member of the county council; in 1895 was elected to the house of assembly where he sat for one term. He moved from Arthurett to Andover in 1882 and took over the business of Beveridge Bros., which he carried on very successfully till the time of
