been so hot she could not lay it. All that I  
am is owing to her."

"Accident insurance companies are very  
suspicious of all accidents involving injuries

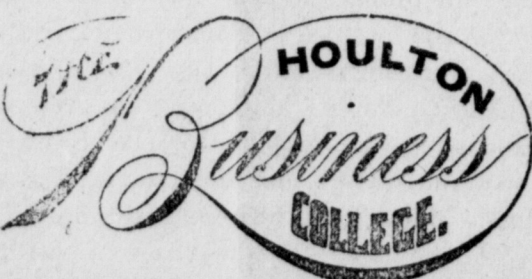
A beggar girl, with clothes tattered and

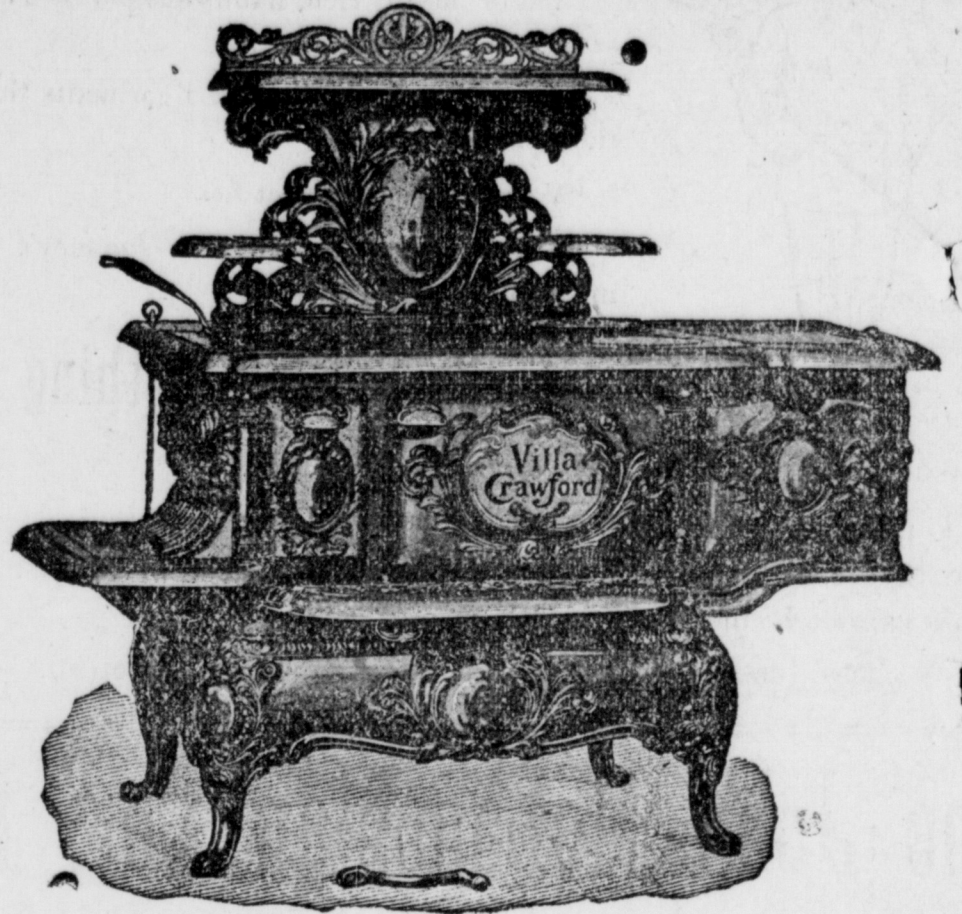
