THE Fairville, N. B., correspondent of the St. John Globe says:—A large propor-tion of the potatoes which are brought from Carleton county for the city supply are unloaded at the Fairville crossing. This fall a large percentage of those coming down are found to be so damaged by frost that they are unfit for household use. Mr. G. Keirstead opened a carload a day or two ago, only to find that all had been spoiled with the exception of 120 barrels. These had evidently been frozen before they left the field. Considerable trouble, which may not all be settled amicably, has arisen between the shippers and the buyers here, over the quality of pers and the buyers here, over the quality of the tubers. The frosts on the upper river have been much heavier than those here, and the farmers have very frequently been caught napping. This trouble, added to the fact that the crops were so rusted that many farmers did not bother digging at all, is likely to boost the already elevated price.
