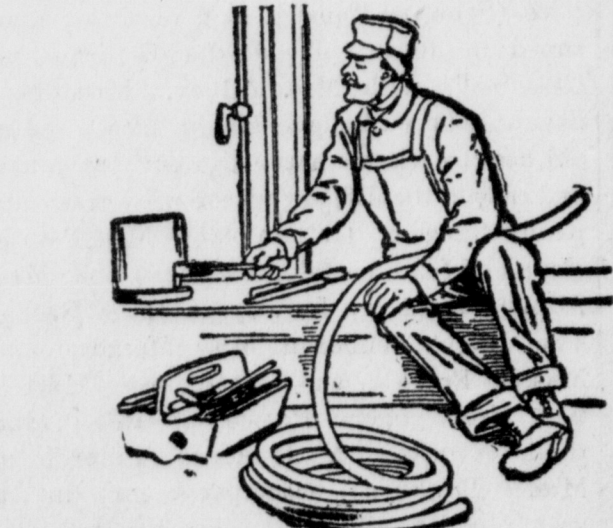

**Hon. James Barnes.**  
In the executive council chambers at one o'clock, Friday, July 5th, James Barnes, M. P., for Kent was sworn in a member of the local government without portfolio. The oath was administered by Mr. J. Howe Dickson, K. C., clerk of the executive council, assisted by Mr. R. S. Barker, in the presence of the lieutenant governor and members of the executive. Immediately after taking the oath Hon. Mr. Barnes attended a meeting of the executive.

Hon. Mr. Barnes is a native of Ontario, having been born near Toronto in 1842 and is therefore sixty-five years of age. He came to New Brunswick when a young man and has since made his home in this province. He resided for a time in Shediac, and then removed to Buctouche, Kent County, where he now resides. He has for a number of years carried on the business of a lumber man and railway contractor and is the president of the James Barnes Construction Company, Limited. He entered political life in 1895 when he successfully contested Kent for a seat in the legislature as a supporter of the Blair Government. He was again a candidate in 1899 and was elected along with his ticket and in the election of 1903 he was again returned.

Hon. Mr. Barnes is a gentleman of good address, an able and forcible speaker and is very popular with his brother members of the legislature. His wife was formerly Miss Jube Smith, of Shediac. In religion he is an adherent of the Church of England.

**St. John Liberals Want Senator Ellis.**

A St. John, N. B., special despatch to a Toronto paper declares that a strong undercurrent of hostility to the advancement of the Hon. William Pugsley, has developed in the ranks of the old line Liberals of St. John. These Liberals, it is said, do not want the extension of Pugsley domination and do not want an added measure of David Russell influence. They would turn Mr. Pugsley down if at the same time they could see their way to strengthen the claims of St. John to government favor. There is an insistent demand for the preterment of the Hon. John V. Ellis, editor of the St. John 'Globe.' The appointment of Senator Ellis would be merely the carrying out of a promise made when the Lavrier Cabinet was under construction in 1896. The New Brunswick portfolio was to have gone to Senator Ellis, but was handed over at the last moment to the late Hon. A. G. Blair, notwithstanding which Mr. Ellis has unwaveringly maintained his allegiance to the best Liberal traditions. In the rehabilitation of the government, it is urged the appointment of Senator Ellis would be quite in order.

**United Baptist Association.**

A very large and representative gathering of ministers and delegates were present on Wednesday in Woodstock at the opening session of the second annual meeting of the Association of the United Baptist Churches of New Brunswick at ten a. m. Rev. W. Camp, of St. John, led the devotional exercises.

Rev. Dr. McLeod, moderator, presided. In his address he referred to the interest involved in the recently consummated Baptist union, which union was succeeding beyond anticipations. The Baptist were greater in number than any other two Protestant bodies in N. B. This fact added great duties to the denomination. Consecration was urged upon all.

F. W. Emmerson, secretary of the Association executive, reported they had two meetings during the year. It was recommended to the Association that the Home Mission

Executive be composed of the Association executive, with three additional members from St. John, and that this committee be elected by ballot without nomination. That salaries under the minimum salary plan be increased to the extent of \$100 to \$150. Correspondence was held with pastoral schools in England with regard to securing pastors. Five were recommended with prospects of their coming.

Rev. D. Long and A. J. Prosses and Wall having removed from the Province, Revs. G. Swin, D. Hutchinson and J. Hughes were chosen in their places. All legacies shall hereafter be payable to this organization.

Communications were read as follows: From the 5th district, urging a course in Sunday School teacher training and Bible study. From Dr. Manning, informing the Association of his retirement from his position as missionary secretary treasurer and extended thanks for kindness received. From the Fredericton church requesting the ordination of Mr. Fred S. Porter and Malcolm Orchard.

The Womens Missionary Society met also at ten o'clock, the President, Miss Augusta Shipp, in the chair. Mrs. C. W. Weyman, corresponding secretary presented a report showing a most prosperous year both at home and abroad. The outlook is most hopeful.

**The Milking Machine in Australia.**

Mr. Spencer Cott, of Lismore, Australia, is on an interesting visit to Canada. He has been deputed by the Australian Association of Farmers' Syndicates to tour the Dominion for the purpose of ascertaining whether Canada has any methods of work or new machinery that it would be worth while for Australian farmers to copy or to obtain. It is reported in Australia, he says, that Canada and the United States have a breed of Jersey cows which beat all others in the world for quantity and quality of milk.

It will interest Canadian farmers and dairymen to know that 135,000 tons of butter are manufactured and shipped for the British market by the Australian Farmers' Syndicates. Each farmer has from seventy-five to a hundred cows, and milking is done by a milking machine driven by a small motor. The operation takes four minutes. No less than eight steamship lines are engaged in carrying dairy produce in England.

For forty years Franz Josef has been King of Hungary. By his accession Austria recognized the political entity of Hungary, and one of the terms of his kingship was the granting of the Hungarian constitution. Hungary has never been wholly satisfied with the union, and an outbreak of Hungarian independence is expected at the death of the emperor-king, who is now seventy-seven years old. Soon after his coronation as Emperor of Austria, nearly sixty years ago, he had to deal with the revolt of Hungary, which Austria subdued with the help of Russia. Our fathers remember when Kosuth was a world hero and pleaded his cause in America. To our grandfathers Greece was the enslaved favorite of the world appealing to lovers of liberty in her fight against Turkey. For us the successor of Greece and Hungary is the Russian people.

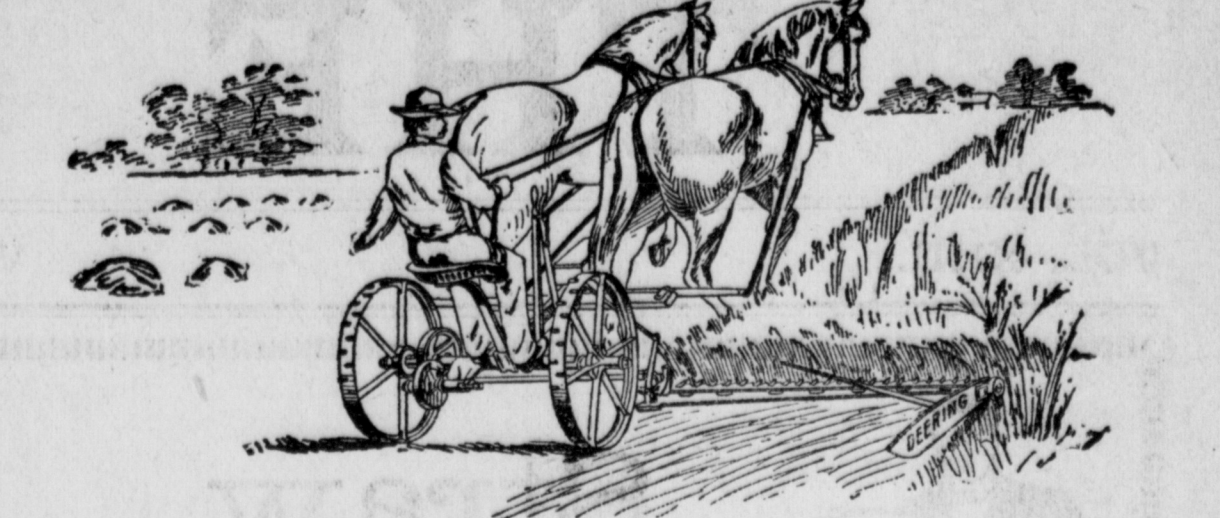
