IS THERE ANY GOLD STREET?

The Bank Deficit is Too Large -- Another Beer License Granted.

The town council met in regular monthly meeting on Monday evening, the mayor in the chair and all the councillors present except Coun. Fisher.

His Worship read the treasurer's report which showed a debit balance at the bank of \$5460.61. He spoke quite severely to the finance committee about the matter, telling them that there had been placed in their hands some time ago a delinquent tax list of \$5,000 or \$6,000 and they had collected only about \$400 or \$500 of it. Now the bank overdraft had exceeded the statutary amount which was \$5000 and there would be a large amount of bills presented tonight, and there would be no money wherewith to pa

On motion of Coun. Dunbar seconded by Coun. Hagerman it was decided to pay Mr. Colwell the sum of \$125 in settlement of his claim for damages to his building on Queen street.

A communication from the board of school trustees informed the council that W. B. Nicholson had been out of town over three months and requested that his place on the board be filled.

On motion Coun, Hagerman, seconded by Coun. Sutton, J. T. Allen Dibblee was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the absence of Mr. Nicholson. The unexpired term expires June 30, 1910.

A beer license was granted to H. H. Moxon of Wellington ward.

Partlow Watson and Theodore McKinney of Chapel street were heard by the council respecting an alleged street from Chapel street near their residences to Connell street just east of Hamilton Bros' residence. It appeared that the Connell estate from whom they had all bought, had recently sold their street to Mr. Mavor. Mr. Watson produced a map of 1873 that showed the street, called Gold street. He could prove it had been in

Mayor Munro had the Alfred Whitehead plan of 1875 produced and it showed no such street. Mr. Watson said he had used the street 26 years ago and the Rev. Joseph Noble said that he had known of the street for 30 years. The people in that part of Chapel street needed the street not only for communication but also because their sewage had to go out that way as the grade on Chapel street from his place was against him.

Mayor Munro-The plan of our sewerage system shows that the sewage from your place was intended to and can come out Chapel street.

Mr. McKinney said that unless the street was opened up the people on the west end of Chapel street would be forever shut in. In winter, for example, the snow plow could not get to them for there was no place either to turn or go through.

The matter was referred to the Street committee.

Shareholders Meeting.

The shareholders of the Cobbler Sexton Copper property situated at Northampton, held a meeting in the council chamber of the town hall Saturday evening, June 1st, for the purposes of organization and capitaliza-

High Sheriff Hayward presided; I. Draper was appointed provisional secretary.

J. C. Hovey, a practical miner, who has taken over the management of affairs, gave a statement of the development of the property to date, and assured the shareholders and all interested that the prospect is exceedingly bright, that the ore not only carries copper but gold and silver values.

The vein runs north and south and a shaft has been sunk twenty feet, showing a dip of 45 degrees east with an increase in ore value as it deepens. The vein has been uncovered for a distance of 400 feet down the mountain side preparatory to tunnelling. The ore is continuous from the shaft, bulging from the vein filling and varying from a few inches to two feet in width, as far as the work has pro-

The location is suitable for tunnelling so that the ore can be cheaply mined, and on account of its nearness to the river the cost of transportation should be very moderate.

Funds were unanimously voted to continue organization and developement. It has not been determined at the present date whether there will be any stock put on the market or not, as the indications are that it will not take a great amount of capital to develop the property.

Ore taken out during developement work will be held until desirable freight and treatnent rates can be secured.

The proceedings of the meeting closed with a vote of thanks to the Mayor and Aldermen for the use of the council rooms.
