Benedictines to Revise the Vulgate.

In a despatch from Rome the correspondent of the Times says he learns the Pope has issued a decree entrusting the entire revision of the Vulgate to the Benedictine order. This is the most important decision yet announced, the correspondent continues, as an outcome of the Biblical Commission appointed toward the end of the pontificate of Leo. XIII.

In an editorial article the Times says it is difficult to overestimate the importance of this step. "No book," the paper declares, "has exercised a wider and more powerful influence in moulding the faith, morals, thought and traditions of the literature of the European world than the Latin version of the Scriptures, which we know as the Vulgate."

A Plan of the Farm.

Prof. Hunt of Cornell University believes that every farmer should have a plan of his farm committed to paper in such a permanent form that it is not likely to be destroyed; the main divisions, that is the fields, should be named lettered or numbered, and be known by those names, letters or numbers at all times. A record should be kept of the rota-

tion of crops, of the production, manuring, and other important transactions in connection with each of these divisions or fields. Each field will soon acquire a separate and distinct individuality and will be treated accordingly. The historical record of the fields on a farm mapped out according to such a plan will prove a matter of increasing interest from year to year and will assist the farmer in so treating his soil that he will get the maximum crop production at the minimum' cost. This, together with increased fertility, is the object of modern farm practise. It may also be added that each farm should have its appropriate name and become known socially and commercially by its name. It seems a simple thing to name a farm, and yet it adds so much to the interest and dignity of rural life that its importance soon becomes apparent and far-reaching.

Good Cooking.

'Good cooking is one of the most effective means of stifling the craving for drink, which is the root of so much evil. Bad cooking is one of the most effective causes of an unequal thirst, and the demand thus created leads very naturally to a supply in the shape of alcoholics. . . There is probably a mental effect produced by a pleasant well cooked meal, which effects the brain and nervous system in an appreciable manner, but one at the same time difficult to explain.



About Leprosy.

The following assertion regarding leprosy may be accepted as accurate. The cause is bacillus, which was demonstrated by Dr. Hansen, a Norwegian physician, in 1874, and diagnosis is no longer a matter of inference or guess. The disease is not inherited, and is rarely found in children before the fifth year. It is contageous, but the exact mode of transmission has not been determined Direct contacts, which permit the bacillus to enter the system of a healthy person through some scratch or abrasion, is the most likely avenue of infection. Leprous women are usually sterile. No cure has been discovered for it, and the use of X-rays, which was prematurely announced as a cure, was deceptive, inasmuch as all patients relapsed. At present the only known method of preventing the spread of leprosy is to avoid contact with it, and to keep the health of the community in good condition by cleanliness, good food, and general sanitation.
