**Off to the Lumber Woods.**

The Hartland lumbermen are getting ready for the winters operation on the Restigouche. D. A. Nixon, J. E. McCollom and J. F. Murdoch left with a crew of men on Monday. They go by way of St. Leonards and will hire more men on the way. They say men are hard to get hold of and therefore wages are high. Woodford Craig goes again to the Restigouche where he has operated for several seasons. He will leave Hartland tomorrow. He says he does not experience any difficulty in getting men or teams.

All agree that the cut will likely be less than last year.

Wages are good; choppers being offered \$28 to \$32 a month, while men with teams command from \$38 to \$45.
