Belgium's Prosperity.

Belgium, with an area of only 11,000 square miles and a population of 7,000,000 exported merchandise to the value of \$231,535,575 during the first six months of 1907, a gain of \$32,000,000 over the same period of 1906.

This was due to the capacity of the producers to manufacture goods which successfully compete with foreign manufacturers in the open markets of the world, and this in turn is due to the domestic, technical and industrial schools which are maintained by the government and supervised by the department of commerce and labor.

The prosperity of the nation is therefore not the result of accident nor of natural resources. The general capability extends from the director of the factory to the least important employe, the elements which enter into it being a prime quality, a continued output, power to produce at the lowest possible cost, and the fact that the government joins hands with the various industries, and by every material assistance in legislation and technical institutions, opens new markets, helps production and furnishes a high standard of skilled labor.

Belgium was the first country to establish domestic training schools in 1889 and its practical curriculum includes maintenance and cleanliness of dwellings, furnishings, laundry work, making and repairing garments, cooking, and in rural districts dairy and garden work and care of poultry. The theoretical teaching consists of hygiene, domestic economy, care of children and sick nursing. Advanced schools are provided, which include designing, millinery, lace making, embroidery, painting, stenography, book-keeping, typewriting, etc.

While women are prohibited from working under ground, they work in manufactories, where technical lectures and demonstrations are given for their special benefit.

In training boys attention is paid to the various industries and the demands of different localities, the studies including mechanical and electrical engineering, work in iron, steel and wood, carpentering, watch-making, jewelry, firearms, bookbinding and gilding, painting, engraving, spinning and weaving, upholstering, tailoring, telegraphy, music and many other branches.

Apart from the government technical training schools private institutions are inaugurated, partly maintained by private enterprise, assisted by the government.

In the school of arms at Liege, 500 years old, every pupil must be able to make every part of a gun and assemble them with facility. This class of labor is always in demand, at home and abroad. In the school of textiles, applications are constantly made for a competent man for superintendent or foreman in some other country. In this and in the school of mining the government, to encourage application, gives a yearly prize, which is called a "traveling purse," to meet expense of a tour abroad; and it also selects graduates from all three schools to act as heads of departments and in other government work.

A Hero of the Bush.

Courage is not an attribute peculiar to the white man, nor is self sacrifice the prerogative of civilization. In Mr. J. C. Firth's "Nation Making" is told a story as touching in its brave devotion as any tale of the Victoria cross. The incident occurred at Orakan, where the English soldiers had just defeated the Maoris. A little party of colonial troops, pursuing fugitives, came upon three natives, two old men and one young fellow.

The youth, seeing the soldiers, dropped on one knee and aimed with his gun at the advancing party, which halted a moment while the old men ran toward the forest. The old men had thrown away their firearms in order to make escape easier.

The soldiers fired at the youth, but missed. Without discharging his gun he sprang to his feet and ran on in advance until he caught

up with the old men once more. Then, facing about, he presented his gun as before, but reserved his fire.

The weary old men gradually drew near cover. Once more the soldiers fired and missed; once more the gallant fellow turned and bounded on. The old men were close to the forest when the youth, nearly fainting, again knelt and took aim, but still did not fire.

The soldiers shot him as he knelt and rushed to the forest, but failed to capture the two fugitives, who, safe in the dense underbrush, made their escape.

On their return the soldiers found the brave young fellow lying dead. His gun was empty; it had not been loaded at all. With it he had covered the retreat of the old men and secured their freedom by the loss of his own life. No more gallant deed of heroic devotion was ever accomplished in any land.

Of Interest to Stockmen.

The name of Professor Robert Wallace is familiar to students of the science of agriculture in all parts of the world. Many of his works, such as "Indian Agriculture," "Agriculture in Australia and New Zealand," "Farming Industries of Cape Colony," together with lectures and papers on educational and agricultural subjects, have a wide circle of readers throughout the British Empire. As Professor of Agriculture and Rural Economy in the University of Edinburgh, he has had a marked influence on the development of scientific practice and agricultural education in North Britain. The greatest work of Prof. Wallace is his "Farm Live Stock of Great Britain" (Edinburgh: Oliver and Boyd, publishers, price 16 shillings net). This is now in its fourth edition, contains over 750 pages, with more than 400 illustrations. The first edition was issued in 1885, the second in 1889, the third in 1893, which was reprinted ten years later. The present edition is the result of rewriting and greatly enlarging the original. It is not only the breeders' guide, and a student's manual, but is at once an historical record and a modern treatise of the great subject of which it deals.

One cannot very well over-rate the value of having in a single authoritative volume the record of the history, development, and present outstanding characteristics of the leading breeds of British horses, cattle, sheep and swine. For a century British farmers have been famous for the excellence of their

live stock, and today are not surpassed in the quality, potency and profitableness of their favorite animals. To have had the opportunity of studying and photographing representatives of the best herds in the British Isles was in itself a privilege.

The comprehensive character of Professor Wallace's work may be indicated by the fact that he treats each phase of his subject with great thoroughness, and includes a practical discussion of the daily problems of the stock raiser. Among the topics to which chapters are devoted are: Principles of breeding, wild white cattle, Shorthorns, Herefords, Devons and Sussex, West Highland, Welsh Black, English White and Red Polls, Aberdeen-Angus and Galloway, Ayrshire, the Channel Island breeds; breeding and management of calves, grazing cattle, house feeding, cows and their management; history, types and breeds of pigs, general management of pigs; history and development of horses, Clydesdales, Shires and Suffolk Punches, thoroughbreds, Hackneys, coach horses, etc., breeding and breaking horses, management of farm horses and treatment of common ailments; island, mountain and moorland breeds of sheep, longwools and short-wools, including the Down breeds, management of sheep, and sheep dogs.

Canadian farmers who are anxious to make themselves masters of the live stock industry will find this work of Professor Wallace intensely interesting as well as a valuable addition to their library.

Bricks Made of Flour.

In England much interest has been shown of late by the army and navy authorities in a new method of preserving flour by means of compression. With hydraulic pressure apparatus the flour is squeezed into the forms of bricks, and experiments are reported to have shown that the pressure destroys all forms of larva life, thus preserving the flour from the ravages of insects, while it is equally secure from mold. Three hundred pounds of compressed flour occupy the same space as 100 pounds of flour in the ordinary state.

Luther Burbank has presented to the Leland Stanford University, California, a box of apples containing seventy-five different varieties, all grown on the same tree. This remarkable production of one tree is the result of several years' experiments by Burbank in tree grafting. The apples are of all sizes and colors. Some are particularly fine for eating, while others are small and not remarkable.

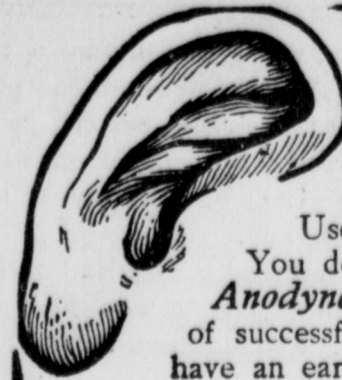
Fine table linen should be frequently changed in order that hard rubbing may not be necessary in laundering them as the clean-process is severer than actual wear.

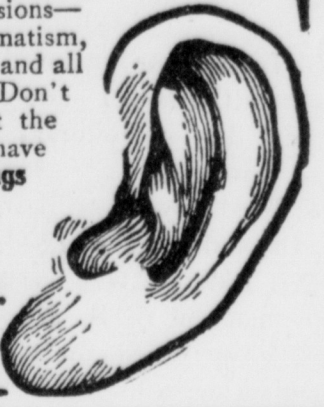

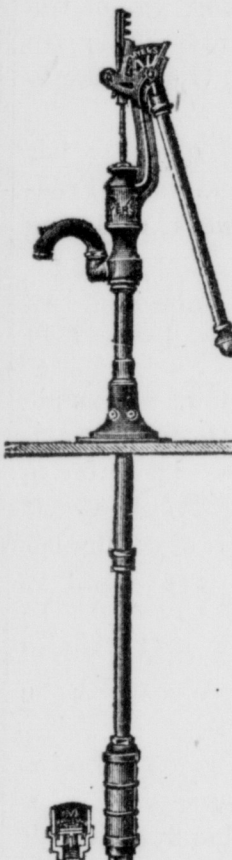
