An Interesting Industry.

The Imperial Packing Co. have their new saw mill up and a part of the machinery running. The building is 20x110 ft. and the power is derived from two engines, one of 16 and one of 75 horse power. When fully equipped the mill will contain a retary, a shinge machine, a lath machine and the cooperage machinery. Just at present it is turning out only the apple crates for the Packing

In the spring it is the intention of the management to put up another building for the spoke and hub works and this will be equipped with an engine of its own.

The Packing department is handling 50 bbls of apples a day, this means the canning of 1000 one gallon cans. On Menday Mr. Hay received an order from Glasgow, Scotland, for a car load of canned apples, about 500 dozen cans.

The company is handling all the pork it can buy but it can't get half as much as it wants. The farmers are holding their pigs to consume the damaged potatoes and wont sell till they get ready.

The company is paying 50 cts a barrel for apples and 8 cts per lb. for dressed pork.
