### The Collins Trial.

Thomas F. Collins, the young Englishman charged with the brutal murder of Mary Ann McAulay at New Ireland, Albert County, over a year ago, is now being tried for the third time for that offence. His Hon. Judge Hannington is presiding. The Hon. W. P. Jones is conducting the prosecution and the Hon. H. A. McKeown and J. C. Sherren are defending the prisoner.

One hundred and twenty-five jurymen have been summoned, as at the last sitting, owing to the number of challenges which the defense took the panel was nearly exhausted: Considering the nature of the case and the fact that it has been tried before no doubt there will be considerable difficulty in getting a jury even from the large panel summoned. Cases both for the defense and the crown will be conducted largely along the same lines as in the two previous trials. It is understood that Collins will again go on the stand to give evidence in his own behalf. It is said that quite a sum of money has been raised for the prisoner's defense.

### The Rev. John H. Hughes.

The Rev. John H. Hughes the second oldest Baptist minister in New Brunswick died very suddenly at his home in St. John on Saturday morning the 14th at the age of 80 years. Mr. Hughes was ordained in Hillsboro, Albert County in 1854 and has thus been 53 years in the ministry.

He was twice married, his present wife being a Miss Hunter of Aroostook Junction. Besides his wife he is survived by one son Welcome, of Worcester, (Mass), and two daughters Miss Elizabeth, of New Haven, (Conn.), and Mrs. W. H. Merritt, now residing in British Columbia. The latter is a daughter by the first wife.

If it is desired to open a box in order to deposit the contents in the Savings Department, the holder must bring the box to the bank and present it to the Teller, who holds the key. All amounts deposited will be entered in a regular Savings Bank book and interest at current rates will be added four times a year.

### William M. Jordan.

The death occurred at Westfield about 11 o'clock Monday morning of William M. Jordan, a former well known business man of St. John, but who had retired from active work for some years.

He was at the home of his niece, Miss Roberts, when death claimed him. As he was 92 years of age it is thought that death resulted from natural causes as he had been in very good health all along. Only last week he was in the city in connection with some legal matters in the Francis Jordan estate, of which he was an executor.

Mr. Jordan was for years connected with the firm of H. Chubb & Co. He was unmarried. He was a brother of the late James Jordan of Woodstock. Mrs. C. D. Trueman of this city is a niece.—St. John Times.

### Harry Golding.

Harry Golding, a well known and respected resident, died at his home in Upper Woodstock last Thursday morning at the age of 85 years. His death was due to a cold contracted a few weeks ago.

Mr. Golding was a native of Lower Wickham, Queens Co. He came to this county fifty years ago. He is survived by a widow who was formerly Miss Margaret Currie, daughter of Richard Currie, of Wickham.

From the time he came to Carleton County he has been a regular attendant at our County and Supreme courts, first as a constable and after the death of the late Mr. Humé, as court clerk. The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon from his late residence. The Rev. S. A. Baker, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Coy, conducted the religious services at the house, and the former at the grave. Messrs George Arnold and Herbert Palmer sang the funeral hymns and Mrs. Ward Burpee presided at the organ. The pall bearers were Alonzo Dow, Solomon Perley, Edward London and Judson Burpee.
