Vatican Needs Repairing.

The Vatican, the largest palace in the world, is in a shocking state of repair, especially the roofs, acres in extent, which have been leaking badly for some time past, in spite of make-shift devices, and will need a complete overhauling at considerable expense. This, however, is being put off as long as possible on the score of economy; and in spite of the stories of the enormous sums which are now being lavished on these headquarters of the administration of the Roman Catholic church, only \$250,000 is just at present being spent in work that cannot be delayed any longer. Thus the apartments of a large number of the Vatican employes are being transferred from the palace itself to a special building set apart for the purpose. The printing presses are likewise being removed to a separate building, while certain picture galleries, the flooring of which had become so insecure that not more than fifty people could be allowed to enter them at one time, are being transferred to quarters of the palace more secure and more convenient to the public. The fitting up of the new apartments for the cardinal secretary of state and the restoration of the Borgia galleries, which he used for some time as a residence, have cost nothing to the pontifical exchequer, having been defrayed by an extremely wealthy Spanish prelate, and private munificence has likewise furnished the means for sundry other works which have been undertaken within the last two or three years. Some repairs and restorations have to be done during every pontificate, but it may safely be asserted that only those that are absolutely necessary and which cannot be postponed will be undertaken under the extremely economical reign of Pius X.

The casual observer may think that the opium traffic—smuggling opium smoking

opium and eating opium—is a minor trade, and indulged in by only a few reckless habits who want to be wafted to other worlds. This is not so.
