His experience in political life, his experience in military life, his experience as a sportsman, as a nature student, as a zoologist, ethnologist, sociologist, race preserver—above all, his great knowledge of men and affairs, including his insight into the character of the American private citizen who engages in mercantile or financial or industrial pursuits—should constitute an equipment which would enable him to make Park Row hum.

It would be rather difficult for anybody to create undue excitement in The New York Tribune office or in the columns of the New York Tribune, but if anybody could do it Mr. Roosevelt would be the man.

What a Tool-Shed Saves.

Assume that a farmer starts in farming with \$1,000 invested in new machinery, and that if sheltered and well cared for, it will last ten years, and if not sheltered, only five years. If the implements stand out in the weather, it will cost another \$1,000 to replace them at the end of five years. The compound interest on this amount for five years at 5 per cent. amounts to \$276.28, or the total amount of money paid out for machinery with its interest amounts to \$1,276.28. A good tool shed large enough for this machinery can be built for \$200. The compound interest on this amount for 10 years at 5 per cent. equals \$125, or the shed may be considered to have cost \$325.60 at the end of the ten years.

After paying for the shed this leaves up, at the end of the 10 years, a balance of \$950.68 in favor of housing the machinery, and the shed is perhaps good for 10 years more use.

The Ideal Minister.

Blue Mountain Prince partakes of three strains of Morgan blood—viz, Woodbury, Sherman and Bullrush—and has a pedigree as follows: Sired by Ethan Allen 2nd, son of Peter's Morgan, by Peter's Vermont, he by Gifford Morgan, son of Woodbury Morgan, he by Justin Morgan. The dam of Ethan Allen 2d was raised by Stephen Dow of Woburn, Mass., and sired by old Ethan Allen, out of the famous Morgan mare Jennie. She was by Halo's Green Mountain Morgan, and her dam was owned by Dr. J. L. Woods of Boston and was called Phebe. She was by Tom Morgan, he by True Briton, making him a half brother to Old Justin Morgan. Phebe's dam was sired by a horse called Nondescript.
