An Old Scandal.

(The Hamilton Spectator.)

The death of Theodore Tilton, in Paris, France, is the closing chapter of the great scandal in New York city thirty-two years ago. When a youth Theodore Tilton attracted the attention of the Rev. Henry Ward Beecher, one of the greatest pulpit orators in the United States, and the pastor of Plymouth church, Brooklyn. Through Beecher's influence Tilton became connected with the New York Independent, owned by Henry C. Bowen, and edited by Beecher. Tilton was a brilliant writer before he had arrived at manhood's estate, and when Mr. Beecher was prevented by his pulpit and lecturing duties from attending to work connected with the New York Independent, at his recommendation Tilton was placed in editorial charge of the paper. Henry C. Bowen had taken up Mr. Beecher when he first went to New York a young preacher, and had him installed into the prominent position of pastor of Plymouth church. It was charged against Beecher that he repaid the kindness of Bowen by substantially breaking up his home. Early in the '70's spiritualism and free loveism broke out in the select literary circle of which Theodore Tilton was one of the charmed centre, and in which Tinnie C. Chaffin and Victoria Woodhull were prominent factors. The two women were sisters, who began their young lives in Cincinnati as fortune tellers, living in an attic in that city and advertising largely in the Sunday Enquirer. They were bright girls, and although uneducated, made the best of their opportunities, and what they lacked in a primary education they made up for by observation and reading. The Chaffin sisters went to New York and branched out as literary women and became identified with the Tilton crowd. It would be a long story to go into details. Victoria married a man named Woodhull, from whom she was afterwards divorced, and when the Beecher scandal swept New York Tinnie C. Chaffin and Mrs. Woodhull went to London, where they cut a wide swath, Victoria marrying an Englishman by the name of Blood, who was an officer in the British army.

Theodore Tilton began suit for \$100,000 against Mr. Beecher for alienating the affections of his wife and ruining his home life. The trial lasted over 100 days, resulting in a disagreed jury, nine being for acquittal and three for damages. Mrs. Tilton acknowledged her guilt to her husband, and also put it in the form of a written confession. Mrs. Tilton had known Mr. Beecher from her childhood, and it was through Beecher that Tilton first became acquainted with his wife, Tilton being only twenty years old at the time of his marriage. The exposure of the scandal ruined Henry Ward Beecher's usefulness. Mrs. Beecher loyally stood by her husband though all of the terrible ordeal, but she hated Mrs. Tilton. Theodore Tilton left the United States and lived in England and in other foreign countries, finally dying in Paris, on Saturday, May 25th at the age of 72 years. Mr. Beecher and his wife and Mrs. Tilton died many years ago, leaving Tilton as the last survivor of the great scandal. Tinnie C. Chaffin and Victoria Woodhull have made their names famous in London as well as New York. The fortune tellers of 50 years ago became wealthy, and wealth covers a multitude of sins.

Pure Milk Delivered in Paper Pitchers.

People who have done so much in the way of the prevention of infant mortality by obtaining pure milk will be interested in what is now being done in London to solve the vexed question of the pure milk supply.

For years and years the London milk supply has been blamed by medical and health officers for a great deal of infant mortality, but very soon in fact almost immediately, the dairy companies are to deliver milk at the doors of houses in paper pails and pitchers which are said to be absolutely proof against germs of air and water.

Paper pails are being made in a new factory at the rate of 50,000 daily, but they will be required to be turned out at the rate of some millions daily if the demand is to be met. These milk pails made from wood pulp, can, of course, be used only once. They will be cheaper than metal pails, pitchers and glass bottles. For one reason all the labor of cleaning and sterilizing will be saved. These pails are a very simple contrivance, twelve times lighter than the ordinary milk cans, and are of a very strong manufacture, finished off after being rendered waterproof by being sterilized in a furnace heated up to 500 degrees Fahrenheit.

Every pail has a close-fitting, flanged cover, which can be quickly adjusted, and, when fixed, effectually seals the milk from any outside influence.

Milking Machines.

(Maine Farmer.)

Milking machines have been installed by practically all of the experimental stations and a large number of individuals, and we are constantly getting inquiries as to results to be expected from their use.

A machine was installed at the Virginia experiment station in July, 1906, and from 35 to 40 cows were milked with it for a period of six months with more or less satisfactory results. Of the entire number there was only one cow that absolutely refused to give her milk down to the machine, and after it was evident that she was going dry from the machine milking it was found necessary to resume hand milking with her. In general it was found nervous and excitable cows gave better results for machine milking than for hand milking. This was very noticeable in the case of an Angus cow and a Holstein cow where a comparison of thirty days milking by hand and machine showed an advantage of 25 per cent. in favor of the latter method. It was also noticed that cows which were in the habit of giving their milk down freely and rapidly were milked as satisfactorily by machine as by hand.

There is no question but that the machine will draw all of the milk out of the milk cistern; the only question is whether this mechanical method will furnish sufficient stimulation to the nerve cells of the udder to cause them to perform their function of milk secretion. It is necessary to manipulate the milk glands thoroughly, and where this is conscientiously and persistently done the majority of cows will probably give as good results for machine milking as for hand milking. At the same time there is greater danger of leaving the cows partially milked by machine than by hand.

A 60-day test was conducted with 20 cows, 10 of them were milked by hand and 10 by machine for the first thirty days. At the end of this time the methods of milking were reversed and the experiment continued another thirty days. The summary of this 60-day test showed a slight advantage in favor of hand milking.

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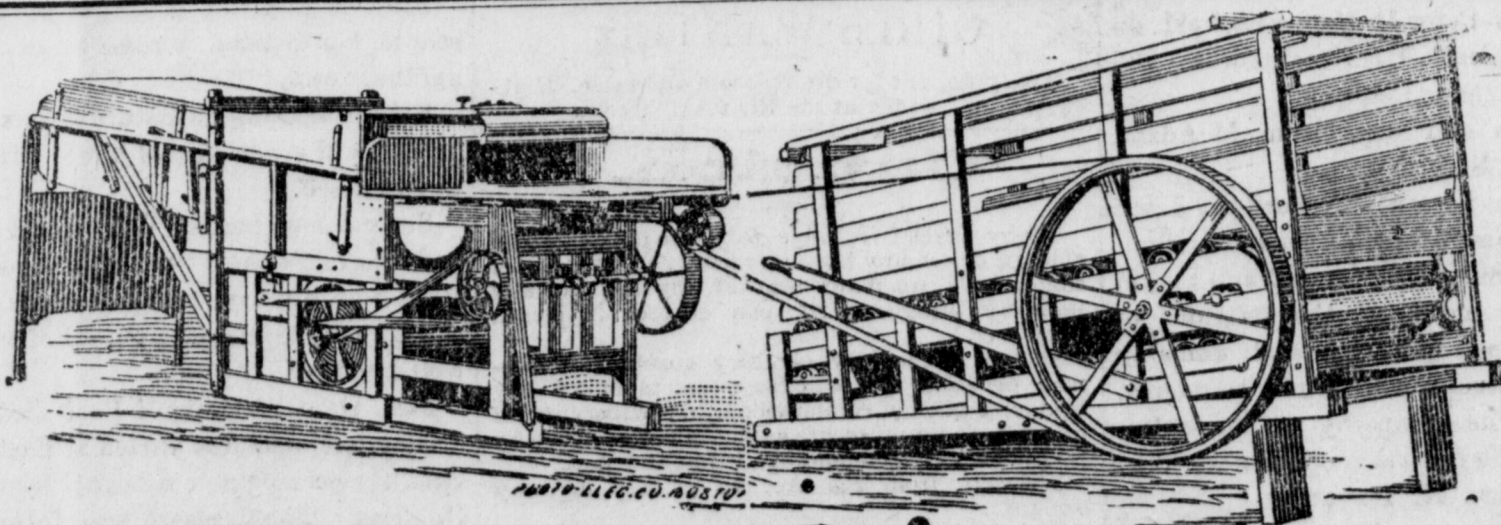
