The one thing of value we learn from his testimony is that the best instrument for committing murder is a sawed off shot gun loaded with slugs. But your abbreviated shot gun, says the gentle cheesemaker and murderer, goes off just when you want it to, and if you are near enough to your victim aim is unerring.

Let all good people who contemplate murder remember this.
