Bristol.

He leaves a wife and one little girl and a number of relatives and friends.

Centreville

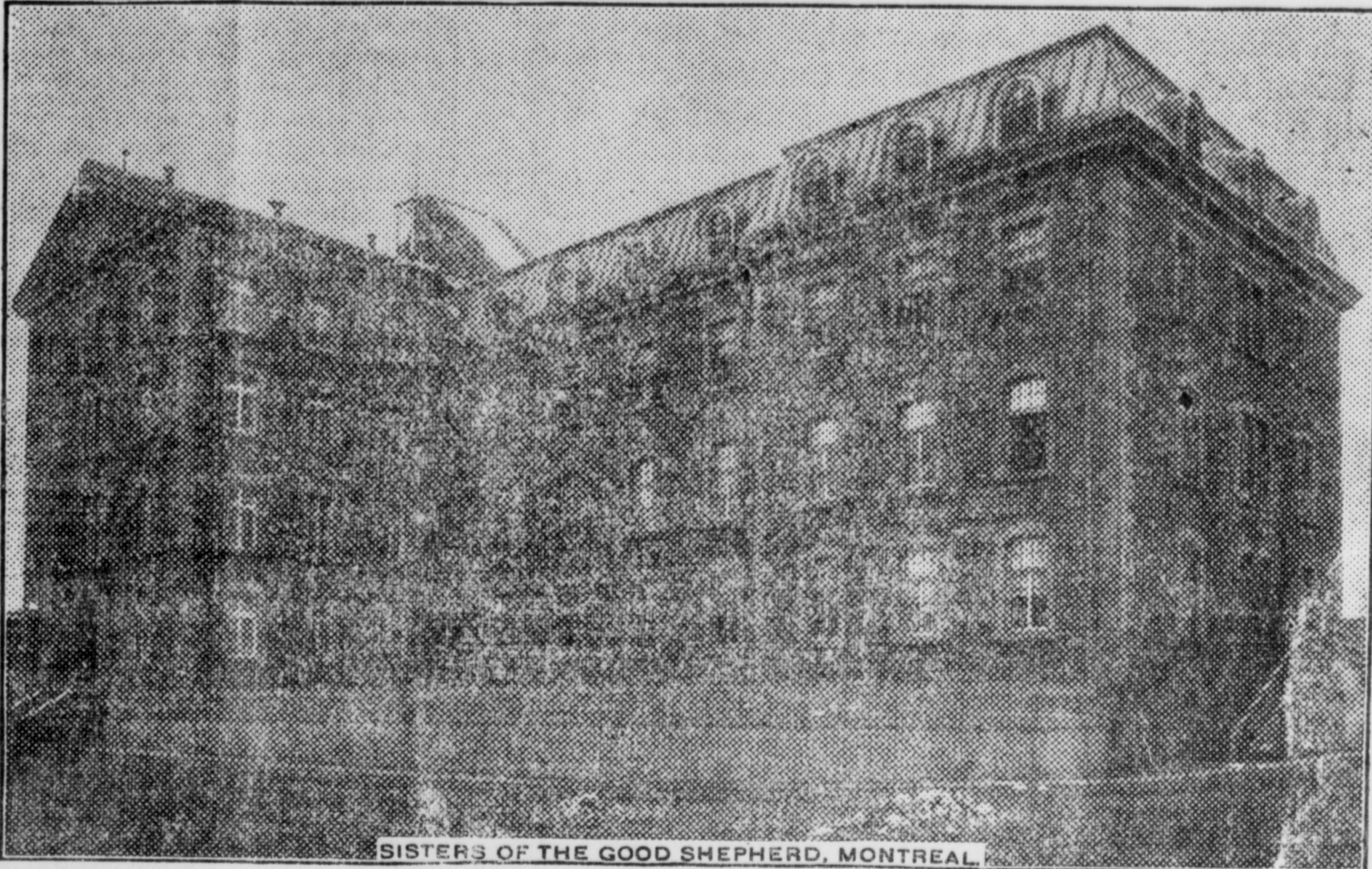
