To Renew Leather Furniture.

There is no furniture more durable than leather upholstered furniture, but it must be kept in good condition. Very often such furniture is allowed to become faded and dull because its owner does not know how to renew it. A dressing that the writer has found very satisfactory for the purpose is

made as follows: Put into a bowl one gill of hot water, half an ounce of arnotto and half an ounce of white soap shaved fine. Place the bowl in a pan of boiling water upon the range. Into a second bowl put half an ounce of bees-wax, shaved fine, and place in the pan of boiling water. Stir the contents of both bowls until they are melted, then take them from the fire. Into the melted wax stir one gill of turpentine, one gill of paraffine oil, and finally the mixture of arnotto, soap and water. Beat the mixture until it is cold; then put it in a wide mouthed bottle or fruit jar for future use. This dressing may be used on brown or red leather. First wash the leather with a soft cloth and hot milk, then rub on the dressing with a soft cloth. If the leather happens to be faded, the dressing may be made darker by using two or three times the quantity of arnotto. If the preparation be for dark green or black leather, add to the mixture a little logwood liquor. The dressing will renew the appearance of any leather articles that may be faded and worn.—"The House Beautiful."

The King as a Host.

As a host the King is at his very best. All the genuine kindness and geniality of his nature shows itself on these occasions, when he loves to lay aside the pomp and circumstance of regal state and assume the role of a country gentleman. As often as not his Majesty will accompany the newly-arrived guests to their rooms, poke the fire, see that refreshments are sent up to them if dinner be not within appreciable distance, and, in fact, give a thorough look round to see that all their wants have been properly ministered to. At the supper which follows the theatrical entertainment usually given at Sandringham on the King's birthday, the Royal host goes, about among his guests, chatting genially with one or the other, and occasionally fetching a sandwich or a glass of the famous Mousse cup for one of the ladies with his own hands. A very young and very shy damsel, who was made the recipient of this honor, was so overcome that she dropped the glass, spilling the contents and shivering it to atoms. "A broken glass brings luck," said His Majesty, soothingly to the blushing young person, who so far recovered her nerve under his kind sympathy as to partake of another glass without a second catastrophe.—Madame.

Potatoes Viennoise.—Peel and boil eight potatoes. When done drain and press through a vegetable press. Mix one level teaspoonful salt, half that quantity of pepper, two ounces butter, the yolks of three eggs, one-half gill of cream and four ounces Parmesan cheese, grated. Mix well. Form the mixture into small, round balls, the size of an egg. Flour a pastry board lightly, roll the potato balls into long shapes, thick in the centre and pointed at ends. Brush with beaten egg, make two slanting incisions on top of each, place them in buttered pan again brush with egg, and bake a nice golden brown in a hot oven.

Chicken Pudding.—Dress and cut a chicken into small pieces, put into stewpan with just water enough to cover, add a teaspoonful of salt when it has simmered half an hour also a pinch of pepper, and cook tender. Remove the chicken and arrange it in a three-quart baking dish. Have ready a quart of green-grated corn, to which have been added three eggs beaten light, a pint of sweet milk; salt and pepper to taste, and pour over the chicken. Dredge quickly with flour and add bits of butter (about two teaspoonfuls in all), and bake half an hour. The broth may be used for a soup on the following day.
