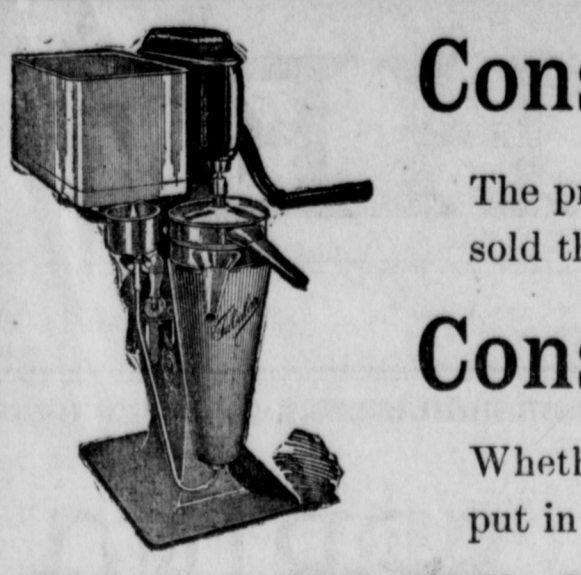
Harvard and Yale.
