Drinking at Meals.

Those who have too little acid should drink very little or not at all at meals; those who have too much acid should drink moderately at meals, and will be especially benefited by drinking one or two glassfuls of hot water two hours after eating.

One exception must be made. Persons who have dilated stomachs should at all times avoid burdening their feeble stomachs with large quantities of liquids, and will do best with a dry diet.

It is best not to drink while eating, but afterwards. Drinking, while eating, interferes with mastication and salivary secretion, and increases putrefaction. Liquids should be taken at the close of the meal.

Cleaning Lace.

Cleaning lace is quite an art, says Tit-Bits and few laundresses clean lace properly. Some laces require gum water, others rice water. Some must be ironed, and others merely pinned out and pressed. First take all the lace you intend to clean, and put it into cold water for a night; this removes all dust and smoke, and so saves the washing water from being changed too often. Many laundresses put all the soiled articles into the soapy water together, which means waste of soap and of time, or maybe she will wash the whole in the same lot of water, which is worse; no rinsing afterwards will ever make them white again. Saturate the laces well in a nice soapy water, then rub them lightly, using a little soap for the soiled parts; clap each between the hands, and throw into the rinsing water as they are finished.

Candy Recipes.

CHOCOLATE FUDGE.

Put into a clean, smooth saucepan two cups of granulated sugar, two squares of chocolate, grated or broken into little pieces; one cup milk, and putter the size of an egg.

Push back on the stove, where it will melt and heat very slowly—an hour is none too much—then bring forward and cook briskly for ten or more minutes, until it "balls" when dropped in cold water. Take from the fire and beat with an egg beater until quite stiff, adding a tablespoonful of vanilla extract.

Pour into a buttered pan, set in a cold place until quite hard, then cut into squares.

NUT AND CHOCOLATE FUDGE.

Mix four cups of brown sugar with three fourths of a cup of rich milk; add two table-spoonfuls of butter and three ounces of unsweetened chocolate. Set back on the stove until the chocolate is melted, then boil until it begins to thicken.

Take from the fire, beat until rather stiff, add two cups of English walnuts or butter-nut meats and pour into a buttered shallow pan. When nearly cold cut into squares.

MAPLE FUDGE.

One pound of maple sugar, broken in small pieces or grated; one cup of cream and milk. Boil until it hardens in cold water; add a cupful of hickory or pecan nuts, stir lightly, then pour into greased pans to cool.

Household Hints.

Removing Spots From Furniture.—White spots on polished tables are removed in the following manner: Coat the spot with oil, and pour on a rag a few drops of "mixture balsmica oleose," which can be bought in every drug store, and rub on the spot, which will disappear immediately.

To Clean Mirrors.—Rub the mirror with a ball of soft paper, slightly dampened with methylated spirits, then with a duster, on which a little whiting has been sprinkled and finally polish with clean paper or clean chamois. This treatment will make the glass beautifully bright.

Cleaning Window Panes.—Takes diluted nitric acid about as strong as strong vinegar, and pass it over the glass pane, leave it to act a minute and throw on pulverized whiting, but just enough to give off a hissing sound. Now rub both with the hand over the whole pane and polish with a dry rag. Rinse off with clean water and a little alcohol and polish dry and clear. Repeat the process on the other side. The nitric acid removes all impurities which have remained on the glass at the factory, and even with inferior panes a good appearance is obtained.

A Simple Way to Clean a Clock.—Take a bit of cotton the size of a hen's egg, dip it in kerosene and place it on the floor of the clock in the corner; shut the door of the clock and wait three or four days. The clock will be like a new one—and if you look inside you will find the cotton batting black with dust. The fumes of the oil loosen the particles of dust, and they fall, thus cleaning the clock.

To Clean Watch Chain.—Gold or Silver watch chains can be cleaned with a very excellent result, no matter whether they be matt or polished, by laying them for a few seconds in pure aqua ammonia; they are then rinsed in alcohol, and finally shaken in clean sawdust, free from sand. Imitation gold and plated chains are first cleaned in benzine, then rinsed in alcohol, and afterwards shaken in dry sawdust. Ordinary chains are first dipped in the following pickle: Pure nitric acid is mixed with concentrated sulphuric acid in the proportion of ten parts of the latter, and a little table salt is added. The chains should be boiled in this mixture, then rinsed several times in clear water, and then in alcohol, and finally dried in sawdust.

VASSAR FUDGE.

Add to two cups of brown sugar one cupful of thick cream. Boil until it hardens in water. Spread a pan with nut mats, stir the candy until it stiffens slightly, then pour over the meats.

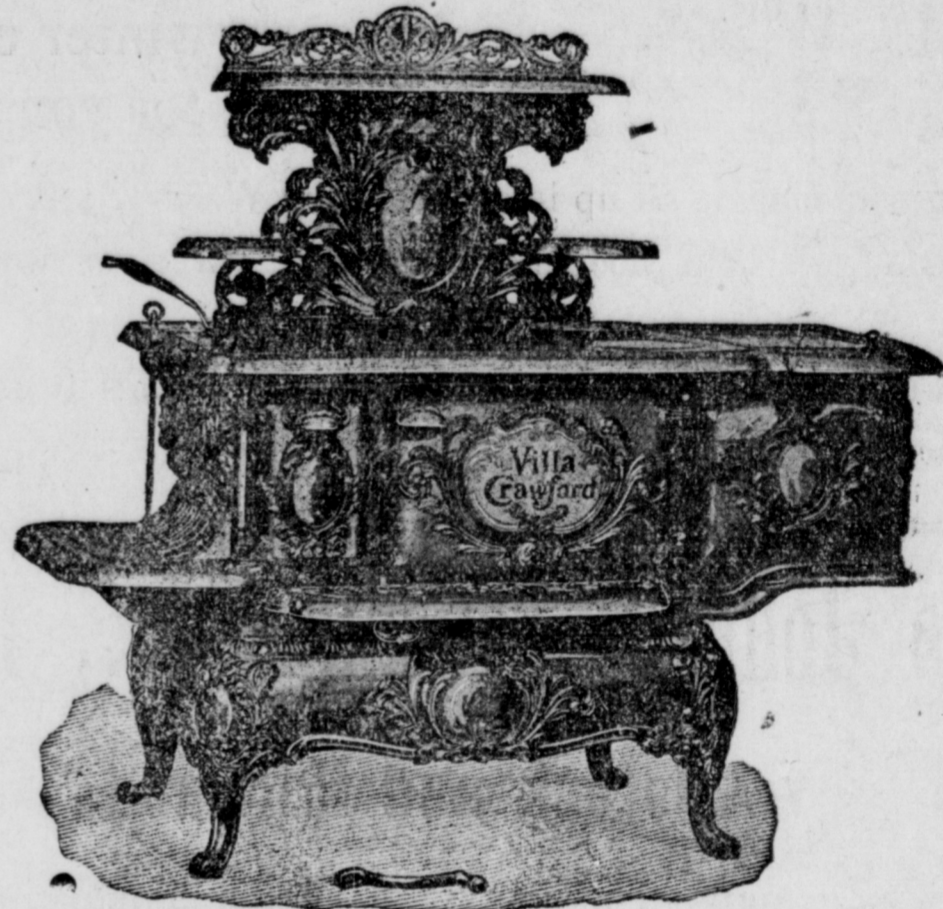
