The members of the 67th Regt Band have recently held several business meetings to discuss the problem of how best they may wipe out their liabilities amounting at the present time to about \$350 00 and they have finally decided to sell all their property and disband. They are now negotiating with outside bands for the purchase of all their uniforms and music besides a number of instruments and the prospect is that they will soon complete the sale. Each member of the band is pledged to turn over all property in his possession no later than Friday evening of this week to the committee appointed to make the sale and our town will now be with out a band for some time to come.

As far as the liabilities of the band are concerned none of the members feel this to be a serious matter for at several other times since their organization they have been in debt to a greater extent than they are at the present time and the present liabilities are due to a heavy expense they were under during the past summer in an effort to increase the membership. This is the problem which has been the most serious with which they have had to contend, for since their organization just five years ago they have lost in various ways no less than twenty eight men all of whom were good musicians and they find their places impossible to fill.

It is a difficult matter to keep up a band in town of the size of Woodstock. The present members have made a great many sacrifices in order to keep it going during these past five years but they have had the satis faction of knowing that their's was one of the best bands in the province. Not only in Camp where they have been in competition with bands from all over the province but in engagements in Fredericton and Houlton and other places they have never yet occupied any other than the first place.
