SIR HENRY CAMPBELL-BANNERMAN.

The death of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, which occurred in London last Wednesday, has called forth a great many personal and sympathetic tributes in this country as well as in the Motherland. The many cordial expressions of discriminating praise, from friend and foe, would indicate that he was one of the most popular men in the public service of Great Britain.

In the matter of natural gifts Sir Henry is said to be only an average man. He had not one of those brilliant qualities of Balfour—the former Premier. He was neither clever nor brilliant as a public speaker. His opponents usually said his speeches were mere academic utterances. In comparison with the skilled debaters, the great orators of the English House of Commons, he made a poor enough showing. He was not regarded as a great statesman of genius, nor even a great administrator. He had neither intellectual greatness nor emotional fervor. And yet, in spite of an acknowledged mediocrity, he became a successful leader of his party, and won the highest honors his country had in her gift for her distinguished sons.

He won not by cleverness, but by hard work. He had at least a genius for taking infinite pains. Once his mind was made up, neither abuse nor contempt could divert him from his purpose. His long public service was filled with patient diligence, and a steady honesty of purpose. What raised him was the assured knowledge of all who dealt with him that he was not serving his country for what he could get, in any form, but simply because he thought he ought to, and that nothing on earth could turn him from doing it precisely in the way that he thought he ought to. His absolute straightforward conduct, his political consistency, his plain dealing and speaking, his unswerving loyalty to principles, his gentle ways and courteous manners, his good nature and cheerful spirits, and with all his sly humor are the universally acknowledged qualities that won for him the entire confidence of the nation, and the admiration and devotion of his friends. It is rather refreshing to learn that at least one man who did his country a great service was not a genius, but a gentleman he had no other greatness than that of high mindedness and devotion to duty.

Some Blouse Ideas.

A really pretty blouse can be contrived from the large printed handkerchiefs with colored border, such as one sometimes sees and wonders if they are used in the ordinary way. Take for example several of these kerchiefs in white with pale polka dots, bordered in blue with white dots. Make the blouse of the centres, which, if a little on the short side, can be eked out with a yoke effect. Use the colored border for collar, cuffs, and front closing or outlining the yoke. One of these handkerchief blouses was made from several big handkerchiefs having white centres barred with pale pink lines, and striped pink and white borders, with a plain outer edge of deeper pink. The body of the blouse was tucked at the shoulders, and the sleeves were made of the cross-barred centres, contrived so that the striped borders met at the centre front. The border was used for the collar, with the deeper pink line at the edge. A natty bow of the pink-edged border finished the collar. The straight cuffs were also formed of the border.

Although more all-white blouses and shirt-waists than any other kind will be worn this summer, still there is a tendency to revive colored waists, or rather those showing a combination of white and colors. The blouse of some thin material matching the heavier skirt in color will be found desirable as soon as the warm weather makes one discard jackets. The striped and dotted linens and silks help to solve the problem of giving a skirt and separate waist the appearance of being in suit. An ecru linen with stripes of dark blue goes admirably with a plain dark blue skirt, and there are some pretty cream muslins with brown polka dots which would go much better than white with the brown skirt. A brown tie of the same shade as the skirt helps to blend the two garments.
