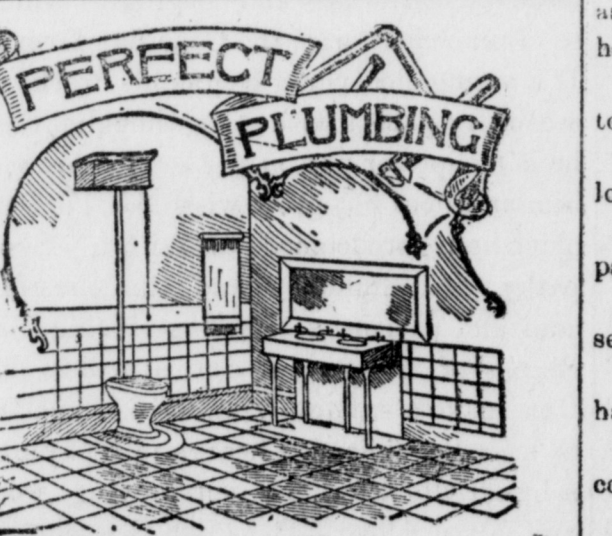

### Carmen and Inspectors Con- Bangor & Aroostook Railway on Strike.

Houlton, Me., Feb. 17.—A strike of all  
the carmen and inspectors on the Bangor &  
Aroostook Railroad went into effect today.  
The strikers include all the men who either  
repair or clean the cars, there being about  
175 on strike. At this place there are only  
the foreman and an assistant to do the work  
ordinarily looked after by a crew of fifteen.  
Efforts are being made to hire others.

At the Bangor & Aroostook headquarters  
here it was said tonight that the strike was  
a demand for the recognition of a recently  
organized union of car repairers, affected but  
a small proportion of the men, and in no  
way embarrassed the road, as larger crews  
were carried than the work at this time of  
the year demanded. Of the sixty men in  
the company shops at Mill Junction, but  
eight had left work. No strike had been  
reported up to noon today of the repair men  
at Northern Maine Junction or at Millinock-  
ett.
