THERE has been a virulent case of smallpox at Grand Falls which gave the natives considerable uneasiness. No new cases are developing, and the schools which had been closed as a precautionary measure have been re-opened.

A STRIKE among B. & A. carmen last week gave the officials of that road some worry, especially as there seemed a likelihood of the track men going out as well. The cause of the strike was a failure of the company to agree to a certain schedule of wages presented by the workmen.

ACCORDING to an Arcootook county exchange about 20 well-known residents of Presque Isle will on March 9 go to California to reside. They will go in a special tourist car over the C. P. R. What's the matter with Arcootook? An exodus like this would compare well with New Brunswick under government.

MRS. CHARLES GOOD of Fort Fairfield died on Feb. 16, aged 70 years. Her maiden name was Priscilla Bourgoine and she was a native of Kingsclear. The "Review" says "Mr. and Mrs. Good moved to Woodstock soon after their marriage, and to Fort Fairfield in 1890. The fruit of this union was 14 children, all of whom lived to grow up."
