Tribute to Ireland.

It is gratifying to people throughout the British Empire who follow Irish questions to see with what manifestations of loyalty the statue of Queen Victoria was unveiled in Dublin by the Lord Lieutenant.

An Irish artist accomplished the work on the memorial; an Irish race are honoring the great queen it represents; and an Irish nation are proud to have the statue in one of its foremost cities.

The affection now being displayed by these people is in return for that which Her Majesty entertained for her Irish subjects.

Her affection for them was well known. Of their loyalty she was well assured, and the happy memory which she retained of earlier visits was published to the present generation when, in the last year of her life, she spontaneously determined to visit Ireland at the cost of great personal effort.

The circumstances of that visit will long be remembered. In a series of desperate engagements in Natal the Irish Brigade had shown a valour and an endurance which excited the admiration of the world, and surmounted obstacles set against them by the nature of the country and the courage of the enemy. The losses of the Irish Brigade were terrible. At Colenso, and again at the long advance culminating in the battle of St. Pieter's Hill, the Irish officers and men had covered themselves with glory and eclipsed all their previous records; but, alas, at a great cost.

Suddenly came the Queen's message of sympathy with the losses of her "brave Irish Soldiers," the orders for the formation of a regiment of Irish Guards, the permission to wear the Shamrock on St. Patrick's Day, and the announcement that the Queen would pay a visit to Dublin.

Her Majesty's arrival in the Irish capital was the occasion of an outburst of loyalty which will never be forgotten by those who witnessed it. It is not too much to say that this single action of Queen Victoria did more to bring Ireland and England together than a hundred acts of remedial legislation and a million conciliatory speeches by English politicians.

Irishmen are ever attached to personalities rather than to laws and institutions. They recognized in the Queen's visit the admission of a duty towards their country which had never been forgotten by Her Majesty, and which had been merely obscured by the advice of timid councillors who were foolish enough to think that such a visit might be unsafe.

It is pleasing to-day to see that this recognition has assumed material shape, and to know that affection for Ireland is one of the valuable characteristics which the Queen transmitted to her son, King Edward VII. Ireland has never had a ruler more sympathetic to their wants and life than His Majesty. In paying such notable respect to the memory of the mother the Irish nation offers a tribute to the qualities which they know inspire the son.
