Bearing in mind these factors, pay no heed to those who say do not plow in the winter, but whenever the land is dry enough keep the teams at work, plowing and also subsoiling when the subsoil is a good clay or the land has a hardpan subsoil. Turn in all the vegetable matter which has beed produced on the land. Do not burn anything which will make numus.
