THE small pox outbreak at Grand Falls has abated and the last cases were released from quarantine last week.

TODAY the marriage of Handford D. Jamieson, of Plaster Rock, and Miss Sidie E. Bishop, of Coronation, takes place.

THE Hon. W. P. Jones has rented the large room over Garden Bros. drug store, and will have it fitted up for law offices.

MRS. MARY J. DOYLE, of Fort Fairfield, Me., died quite suddenly of heart failure on Wednesday of last week. Mrs. Doyle whose maiden name was Raymond, was born in Florenceville, N. B. June 13th, 1829.

AT its recent town meeting Houlton assessed itself \$75,000 for expenses and municipal improvements the coming year. This is a greater sum than the combined amount Woodstock and Carleton Co. is assessed.

AT the Aroostook Hospital, Houlton, last week, George Craig died of injuries he received while braking on the Ashland branch of the B. & A. He was a native of St. Andrews, where the remains were taken for burial.

The dedication sermon will be preached by Rev. H. D. Marr, former pastor, now of Queens Square, St. John. The Manzer memorial window will be unveiled at the morning service.

ON Saturday morning a man was found in James Christian's barn at Middle Simonds, in a chilled and sick condition. He was taken to the house and kindly cared for until Monday. The man gave his name as Samuel Perkins and it was discovered that he had taken French leave of the poor-house at Milltown, N. B., and had been tramping the country for some time. He is mentally unbalanced. The poor authorities of both Simonds and Milltown were notified and on Monday Deputy Sheriff Foster took him back to the institution from whence he escaped.


