In this space last week we recorded the fact that such a life-long Liberal as Rev. John Perry intended voting for Smith, Flemming and Munro. Another strong Liberal, Joshua Corkery, of Woodstock, and hundreds of others have expressed themselves in a similar way.

All good thinking Liberals, anxious for better government will vote the Opposition ticket throughout the province.

Solicitor General Jones, in his address in this county last week, said that Mr. Hazen is not appealing to the people on coalition lines, and that Premier Robinson is running as a Liberal government.

Mr. Hazen has repeatedly stated that it matters little to him whether the Opposition candidates are Conservative or Liberal. He believes in running our local administration right, regardless of either party, and if he is elected he will form a government of good, honest true men, such as this province has never had since confederation. The opposition ticket nominated in Northumberland on Monday contains at least two Liberals, John Morrissey, of Newcastle, and Mayor McLaughlan, of Chatham. Premier Robinson has refused to acknowledge the Liberal ticket in Gloucester and is supporting a Conservative ticket there, Messrs. T. M. Burns, M.P.P., Joseph Poirer, M.P.P., and Raymond Young. With the Premier it is purely a case of securing candidates, no matter what their political views may be. The government is using the Liberal cry where it thinks it can win and is running on any principle where the Liberals are opposing the government.

Liberals in Carleton will not be dragged into voting for the government candidates by F. B. Carvell and W. P. Jones, but will cast their votes for FLEMMING, SMITH and MUNRO.
