

American Heiresses Who Have Married Titles.

The suggestion that a graduated tax, increasing according to the amount of the fortune the lady takes with her, should be put upon rich American brides who marry titled foreigners may seem somewhat amusing to us in this country, but there is no doubt that if such had been imposed years ago it would. have provided a very remunerative source of revenue for the United States. It is estimated, for instance, that no less than £34,000,. 000 has been taken out of America in the last twenty years by American heiresses who have married European nobles.

And, as will be seen from the following table, Great Britain has "bagged" most of the big prizes, although Hungary has reason to congratulate itself on the coup of Count Laszio Szechenyi, who has just married Miss Gladys Vanderbilt, and has thus become the husband of a wife with the very comfortable dot of £2,500,000. Altogether fifteen American heiresses, representing total fortunes of £26,000,000, have married British husbands, while eight, including Miss Vanderbilt representing £8,700,000, have been won by Continental noblemen.

It is now possible to perform operations. for tuberculosis.

Two eminent London surgeons are undertaking these cases, and in Germany operations on the lungs-hitherto considered as impossible as, till recently, were operations on the heart-have been made successfully. Recently a lady on whom an operation was performed in London, was reported to be making excellent progress. All the tuberculosis portions of the lung wers taken out. In performing the operation the surgeon raade use of a special instrument for stanching the flow of blood, which usually rushes out so rapidly that the patient bleeds to death in a few moments.
