Knife for Consumption.

It is now possible to perform operations for tuberculosis.

Two eminent London surgeons are undertaking these cases, and in Germany operations on the lungs—hitherto considered as impossible as, till recently, were operations on the heart—have been made successfully.

Recently a lady on whom an operation was performed in London, was reported to be making excellent progress. All the tuberculous portions of the lung were taken out.

In performing the operation the surgeon made use of a special instrument for stanching the flow of blood, which usually rushes out so rapidly that the patient bleeds to death in a few moments.
