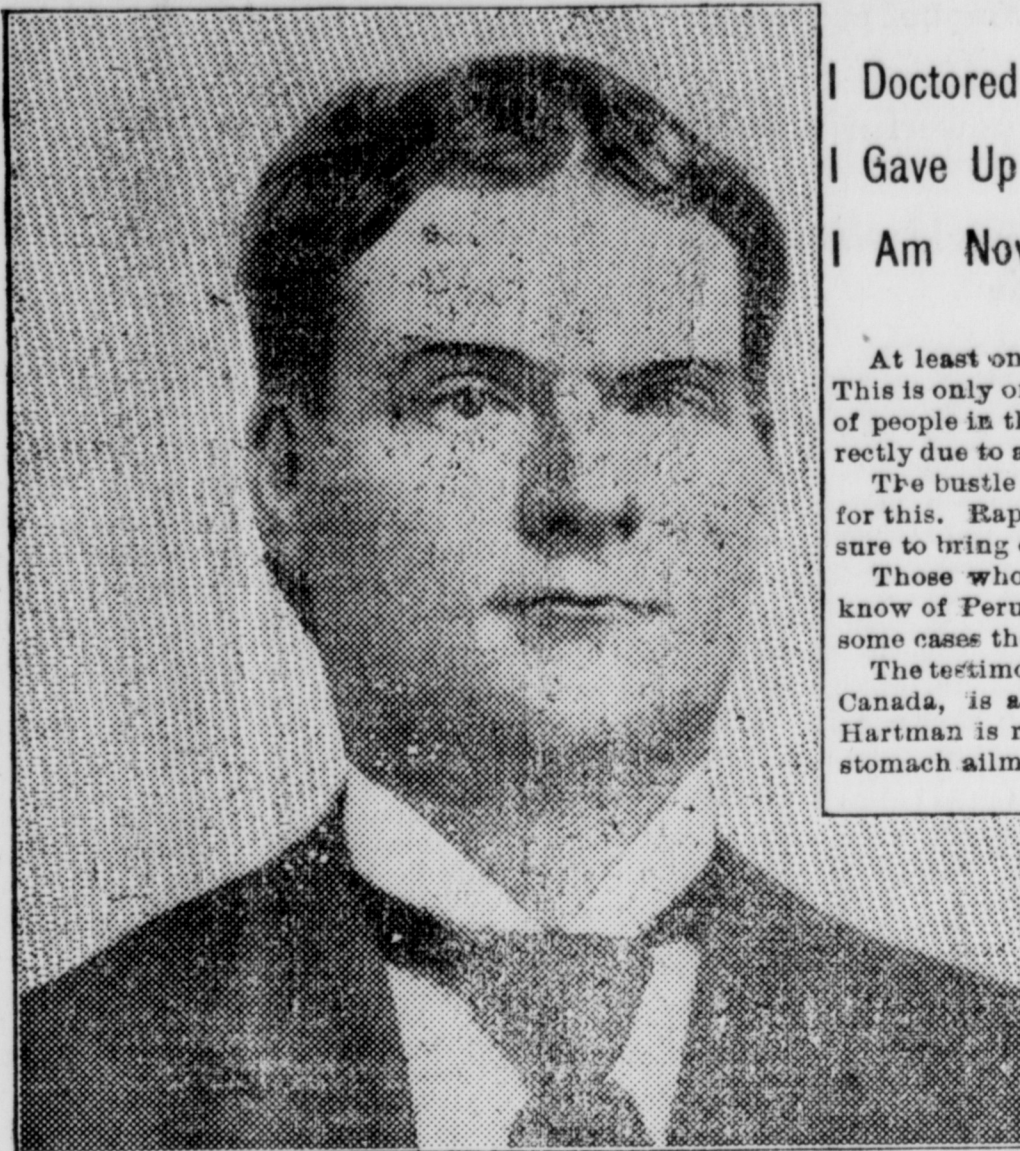
## Jacksonville.
