### A King's Dream.

On June 12, 1645, Charles I. slept at the little inn in Naseby village. Scouts had brought news of the approach of the parliamentary army, and the king was resolved to give them battle.

In the middle of the night the lords of the bedchamber, who slept in the outer room, were disturbed by an extraordinary noise in the king's room. Upon entering they found Charles sitting bolt upright in his bed and in a much excited state.

On asking what the noise was, the king said he had heard no noise, but that their entry had roused him from an extraordinary dream. He said that Strafford had stood at the foot of his bed and implored him not to give battle, for if he did he would be so disastrously defeated as to threaten his crown and even his life.

The next morning Charles told Prince Rupert and his generals of his dream, but declared that he would fight. They in vain tried to dissuade him. In the evening news arrived that the enemy were close at hand. That night Charles again dreamed the same dream. Strafford warned him that it was the last time he would try to help him.

The next morning the king led his army out and by sunset he had lost cannon, baggage and four-fifths of his troops and, as events proved, the war as well.

Strafford's ghost was right. Had Charles not met Cromwell at Naseby it is quite likely he would not have met his death at Whitehall.

### How The New Army Bayonet Is Made.

The order for the manufacture of 55,000 bayonets, of new design, which has just been issued by the War Office, marks another period in the history of a weapon which, though small, has turned apparent defeat into victory in many a British and foreign battle during the last 200 years. The bayonet was first manufactured in Bayonne during the latter half of the seventeenth century—hence the name bayonet.

Since the Sudan campaign of 1884-5, when many bayonets were twisted and bent in charging, special attention has been paid the manufacture of these weapons, which must now withstand severe tests before being issued to the troops. Shortly after the aforementioned campaign the Wilkinson Sword Company, Ltd., who will make the 55,000 new bayonets already referred to,

received an order for 150,000, a stipulation of the order being that each blade should stand a weight of 160lb. on the point without the slightest deviation, and a blow on the back of 170lb. from a proving machine.

The new bayonets will be 5in. longer than the old pattern, which were 22in. in length. They will be sword-like in shape and far more effective, according to military experts, than the old style of bayonet, which, it is contended, while being useful for such work as clearing away brushwood, etc., while on the march, were lacking in cut-and-thrust power when the troops came into contact with the enemy.

Needless to say, bayonets are now made from the finest steel, and it is an interesting fact that before the final stage is reached each blade goes through no fewer than 200 operations. The steel blade is first of all welded to a wrought-iron socket, and afterwards a forging machine gives a rough outline of the required shape. The blade is then rolled and cooled gradually under charcoal and coal-dust for annealing purposes, after which the socket is drilled and the blade ground. Finally, the blades are fine ground, hardened, tempered, tested, and polished, while the sockets are browned and adjusted to the rifles.—Tit-bits.

### Took His Own Poison.

A story that reads like a chapter from a sensational novel comes from the Fangeas, in Lozere, southern France. In this out of the way spot dwells an innkeeper named Avignon, with his sister and little nephew, a boy of eight.

On a recent evening an old man who seemed to be sick made his appearance at the inn and asked for accommodation. Avignon invited him in and left the stranger alone with his little nephew while he went on with his work.

When he re-entered the room the boy, childlike, observed that there would be no need to salt the potatoes, as the old man had put salt into the saucepan in which they were boiling during Avignon's absence.

If Avignon had any suspicions he concealed them, but when they sat down to supper and the old man refused to take any of the potatoes the innkeeper acted in a way that must have astonished the guest. Avignon took down his gun and, covering the stranger with it, commanded him to partake of the vegetables, and despite the protests and excuses of the old man he was obliged to eat. No sooner had he done so than he fell to the ground in great agony and soon afterward expired.

Avignon searched him and found in his pocket, besides a revolver and a knife, a whistle. The latter suggested an idea to the innkeeper. With the gun still ready for emergencies, he blew the whistle, and on two men running toward the inn he fired. Neither appeared to be hit, but the unexpected nature of their reception caused them to turn tail, heedless of the fate of their accomplice. The plot, thus frustrated by the observation of the little boy, seems to have been aimed at the savings which Avignon is generally credited with having. Having poisoned Avignon, his sister and his nephew, they would have possessed themselves of whatever there was worth taking in the inn and have got quietly away.

### Odd Combination In Spring Suits.

Some suits are made of the natural pongee, with the skirts of the plain material, while the coats are Eton shape, embroidered by hand in large black dots. The same idea can be carried out in suits of voile or even mohair, and at least, if the fashion is peculiar, it is new and smart.
