Many an old-time Methodist is grieved by the action of the New York conference in voting to expunge the iron-clad article in the Methodist Episcopal Book of Discipline forbidding church members to play cards, dance, attend a theatre or watch a horse race. And yet we have no doubt that the conference has expressed the sound judgment of of the vast majority of churchmen represented by its delegates. It has simply placed the burden of moral responsibility where it belongs, upon each individual.

As several clergymen have hastened, somewhat needlessly, to point out, the abrogation of the article would not imply the encouragement or even the justification of any of the practices heretofore prohibited. It would merely mean that the general conference recognized the futility of laying down cut and dried rules of conduct for intelligent persons.

The attitude of such a large body of representative churchmen is a fresh indication of the rapidly growing moral sensitiveness of Americians. It is becoming clear that the right and wrong of card playing, dancing and theatre going can be determined only by a consideration of the attendant circumstances in each particular case. Sweeping dogmatic prohibitions not only fly in the face of reason but fall to control the action of those on whom they are enjoined.

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
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
