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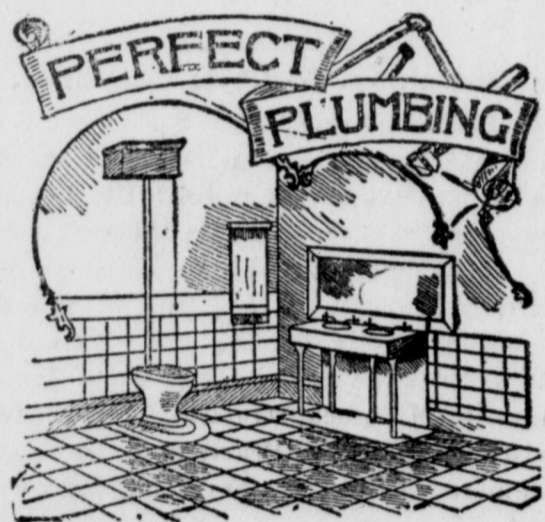

Married Men Live Longest.

If you desire to live to a good old age you
will do well to read what an eminent doctor
says on the subject. He has given much
time to the study of longevity, and the con-
clusion at which he has arrived are based on
statistics which seem in all respects reliable.

He makes, first of all, the bold statement
that anyone who desires to live for four score
and ten years should get married. In other
words, he claims that conjugal life is a nec-
essary condition of longevity. Here are the
statistics which support this statement: Of
200 persons who have reached the age of
forty years the doctor found that 125 were
married and seventy-five unmarried. Of
seventy men who had reached the age of
sixty years he found that forty-eight were
married and only twenty-two unmarried. He
next took thirty-eight men, each of whom
was in his seventieth year, and he found that
twenty-seven were married and eleven un-
married.

Again, the doctor has discovered that the
mortality among bachelors between the ages
of thirty and forty-five is as high as 27 per
cent., whereas among those who are married
it does not exceed 18 per cent. It is evident
that we must acknowledge the potency of
these figures, and that, if we desire to live to
a good old age, we should get married as soon
as possible.

Talking Lovebird.

A lovebird no larger than a canary, has
taught itself to speak as fluently and as dis-

The bird is of exquisite plumage, and
belongs to Mr. J. Skidmore, of Stamford
house, Ambleside, a well-known resident in
the district. It was given to him six months
ago by his son-in-law, who had had it for
eighteen months without its showing any
powers of conversation.

During the last few months of its life in
Worcestershire, however, it has required a
remarkable aptitude for repeating all that is
said to it, though it has received no special
training.

To a correspondent who "interviewed" it
recently the bird suddenly remarked, "Kiss
me quick," giving an anticipatory smack. It
politely remarked, "How do you do?" and
flatteringly added, "You're a little beauty,
aren't you?" all in a soft tone that was quite
distinct from the raucous accents of the aver-
age parrot. It melodiously whistled a couple
of bars of the national anthem, and proceed-
ed to give some very realistic imitations of
the calls of thrushes, sparrows and linnets.

"Hanschem," as the bird is named, weighs
barely an ounce, and is believed to be the
smallest bird of his kind capable of imitating
human speech. His chief companion is a
large stuffed green parrot, which he has so
pecked away with kisses that the entire head
and neck are now bald. The love bird, when
taking a meal of linnet seed, places a little in
the motionless beak of the stuffed parrot
though when in a conversational mood, he
frequently indulges in furious attacks on his
silent companion.

An Illustration.

As an illustration of what had been hap-
pening in the United States in the few years,
the story of an attorney of Butte, Montana
is told. The attorney had earned in Butte
an income of from \$2,500 to \$4,500 per year,
acting for a large copper company. He was
called to New York in connection with cer-
tain litigation and when the matter in which
he had been engaged had been concluded, he
received as a gratuity three thousand shares
of the company's stock worth and sold on
the market for \$11 per share. The stock of
this company was sold in the transfer by a
large corporation which controlled it for \$15
per share. As soon as the transfer had been
made, the public began to buy stock in large
quantities and the price rose to \$45 per share
the actual productive value of the mine be-
ing in the neighborhood of \$10 per share.
When the price had risen to \$45 per share,
the Butte attorney borrowed \$100,000 on
the strength of the three thousand shares
which he had held, and with the money
bought an interest in a large brokerage firm
of New York city. He bought a fine resi-
dence, an automobile and led a brilliant life
for a few years when he died. On the day
that he died his copper stock was selling for
\$11 per share, all the water having been
again squeezed out.
