Town Council

The last meeting of a Town Council is always a serious and solemn meter. The final meeting of the Town Council was held on Tuesday evening of last week. The Mayor presided and about the board, in their accustomed seats, were Couns. Noble, Sutton, Hagerman, Burtt, and Fisher.

The Town Treasurer's report is naturally of very great extent at this particular meeting. It showed in gross that the receipts were \$38,657.73; expeuditures \$38,673.73. made up as by the following tables: RECEIPTS.

The committee on licenses and by-laws re ported and their report which was verbal was submitted by the town clerk Mr. Hartley, who explained that he had a talk with Mr. Clinch when he was here who thought that the Fire License By-Liw could well be amended by allowing, within the district, the erection of certain buildings such as dwelling houses, churches and warehouses provided metal or some or some such fire proof roofing should be placed on the build ings. The committee recommended that the town clerk be authorized to confer with the Board of Fire underwriters on the subject. Coun. Noble recommended on behalf of the License Committee that store keepers who do not mean to do bonified business within the town, be subject to a license of \$10 per day, \$30 per week, \$60 per month aud \$100 for a year. This is a marked raise in the by-law which formerly provided for \$5, \$20, \$30 and \$60 respectively. This by law is supposed to aim at people who come in tewn to carry on slaughter sales of goods. The report of John A. Lindsay, Scott Act Inspector was submitted. It showed that 55 cases had been tried, in some of which convictions were obtained and in some dismissals were found. The total of fines imposed was \$1050.00, of which \$500.00 had been paid, the remaining standing over. In several cases fines were allowed to stand the parties having announced that they would quit the business. These were largely pocket peddling cases. The report was referred to he Scott Act committee.

After some routine business the council adjourned.






